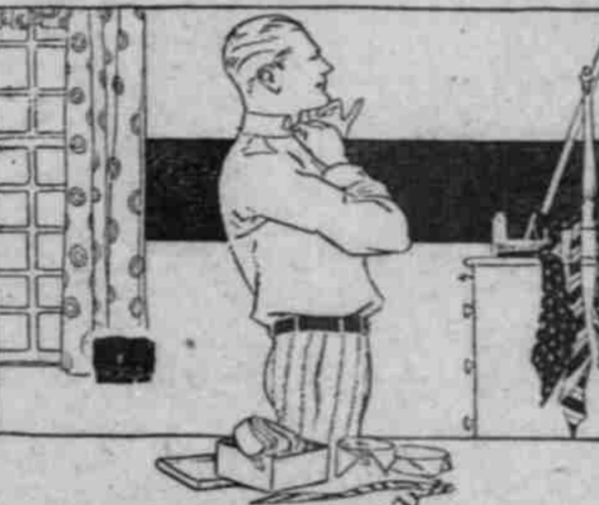

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LINCOLN PARK PLANS PLAY

Playground to Have Independence Day Programme Monday.
The Fourth of July will be celebrated Monday at Lincoln Park by a general programme of sports, in which the public generally will participate. The morning will be devoted to athletic tests on the apparatus for which the boys and girls are awarded park emblems. In the afternoon there will be drills by the girls, a track and field meet for both boys and girls, with comic events, followed by match games and free play.
A feature of the celebration will be a family relay race in which each child, mother and father each runs a relay.

NEW LIBRARY IS IN USE

Sellwood Branch Moves Into Modern Quarters.
The new home for the Sellwood Branch Library, erected on Nehalem avenue and East Fifteenth street, was occupied Thursday for the first time. In honor of the occasion the weekly conference of the Portland librarians was held in the new building Thursday. There were 14 librarians and some friends present. Luncheon was served at noon by Mrs. G. M. Banks. The library has a capacity of about 2000 books.
The cost of the building was about \$3500. It occupies a lot 109x25 feet. The Sellwood Library was started as a reading room about eight years ago, and was the first suburban library in Portland.
Receiver Surrenders Papers.
CENTRALIA, Wash., July 2.—(Special.)—John Galvin, receiver of the Union Loan & Trust Co., yesterday was ordered by Judge Rice, in Lewis County Superior Court, to return to Mrs. Mary Gilchrist certain papers and warrants which she filed suit to recover. George Mason, former cashier of the trust company, acted as Mrs. Gilchrist's agent in buying the warrants. He kept them in a pigeonhole in the bank in an envelope marked with Mrs. Gilchrist's name. When Mr. Galvin took charge of the bank's affairs he took possession of the papers and refused to give them up unless a court order was forthcoming.

ELKS' SITE COSTS \$107,400

Two Lots at Twelfth and Alder Streets May Hold Future Home.
At a valuation of \$107,400 the Portland lodge of Elks has arranged with Dr. Charles W. Cornelius for the purchase of two 50 by 100 foot lots located on the northeast corner of Twelfth and Alder streets. As \$24,900 of the payment Dr. Cornelius will accept a 50 by 100 foot lot situated on the southwest corner of Thirteenth and Taylor streets.
For the present the Elks will hold the Alder-street property as an investment, but it is possible that the site will be used some day for the erection of a new Elks Temple to succeed to the present quarters at Stark street and Broadway.

WOODMEN PROVIDE \$1500

Multnomah Camp Arranges for Drill Team to Compete at Fair.
Multnomah Camp No. 11, Woodmen of the World, has voted \$1500 to defray the expense of the camp's team to San Francisco to participate in the Woodmen of the World contest to be held at the Panama-Pacific Exposition August 11. The drill team will be accompanied by C. A. Robert, consul commander; J. D. Wilson, clerk; L. Keenan, assistant clerk; T. J. Neander, and J. L. Wells, managers, and James Rudiman, past consul commander.
H. R. Cooley is in immediate charge of the team as its captain, and he has given much attention to drilling the team.

Demonstration Car to Be Run

SALEM, Or., July 2.—(Special.)—Superintendent of Public Instruction Churchill has been notified by H. A. Hushaw, general freight agent of the Southern Pacific Company, that the company is planning in conjunction with the Oregon Agricultural College to operate a fruit canning and poultry demonstration car in the Willamette Valley, commencing about July 12. Mr. Churchill is in hearty sympathy with this movement, which is closely allied to the work which the State Department of Education is doing through its Industrial Club workers, and will assist in obtaining the attendance of the school children at the various points to be visited.
