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STREET IMPROVEMENT COMPLETED.
 Improvement of the extension of sidewalk south from Woodward avenue, with a portion of Brooklyn street, has been completed although they are not open for public use as yet. Greatly improved the side of the bluff overlooking the Willamette River for about six blocks and then turned to make a connection with East Second street. The extension of Grand avenue makes curves along the bluff, and for about a block south of Woodward avenue was paved with macadam.

CO-OPERATIVE CANNERY BUILT.—The co-operative cannery at Gresham is in full operation under the general charge of Manager James Sterling. The cannery has been putting up berries grown by W. W. Cotton and R. C. Denning. The former is furnishing mostly loganberries, while the latter furnishes raspberries, blackberries and blackberries. Much fresh fruit is being shipped to Portland and some to canneries. Manager Sterling reports the red raspberries produced in Powell Valley are of fine quality. He says that the demand for loganberries is rather limited this year, but for red raspberries the demand is unlimited and there is no danger of overproduction. Establishment of the cannery at Gresham will save large per cent of the berries this year. He said, shipments of berries being made where they cannot be canned. The growers are receiving cash for berries where formerly they received little or nothing, according to the cannery reports.

COMMISSIONER BAKER VISITS PARK.—J. W. Campbell, W. H. Golden, A. N. Willis and H. M. Huff are the committee that took Commissioner George L. Baker through the Sellwood Park last week with a view to securing some needed improvements which the Sellwood Board of Trade has been asking. Every part of the park was visited and carefully examined by the Commissioner, who said that he desired to get acquainted with the condition of all the parks. Furthermore, he said he desired to get into touch with the people. This committee is formulating a list of improvements needed in the Sellwood Park and later will present the list to Commissioner Baker at a banquet soon to be given the Commissioner in Sellwood, at which time opportunity will be given the citizens to meet Mr. Baker.

LABORERS' INDICTMENTS DISMISSED.—Circuit Judge Gatens yesterday dismissed three larceny indictments against Ben Thompson, whose conditional pardon was granted for the second time recently by Governor Withycombe. Thompson had been pardoned conditionally by Governor West. This was revoked by Governor Withycombe. Attorney Roscoe Hurst then succeeded in getting a second pardon and yesterday the District Attorney's office consented to the dismissal of the three indictments standing against the prisoner.

KENILWORTH WANTS SWIMMING POOL.—Residents of Kenilworth and vicinity are anxious that a swimming pool be built in Kenilworth Park. Rev. L. K. Richardson, chairman of the committee in charge of the community celebration Monday, said yesterday that the need of a swimming pool is great. "It will be some time before we can get the pool as a first-class pool will cost \$20,000," said Richardson. "And people are not inclined to vote bonds at present."

FIREMAN'S WIDOW TO GET PENSION.—Mrs. Louise Klose, widow of a fireman who committed suicide recently, is to be the first widow to receive a pension under the firemen's act. Mrs. Klose will receive her pension each month and yesterday decided to award her \$40 a month each month. She lives at 1000 Grand avenue, a resident of Oregon.
