BUSINESS ACTION DELAYED

Application of Captain Peterson for Renewal of Branch at Astoria Is Granted—Meetings to Be Second Tuesday in Month.

Organization of the new personnel of the Oregon State Board of Pilot Commissioners, as named in June by Governor Withycombe, was perfected yesterday.

When United States Senator George E. Chamberlain was Governor of Oregon he appointed Fred N. Pendleton, of Buffum & Pendleton, and Fred H. Mann, a shipchandler, members of the commission from Multnomah County, and they served with Judge Taylor of Astoria.

At yesterday's session Captain Speier was named temporary chairman and was nominated for president. He declined the position, retiring in favor of Mr. Wilson.

SALEM, Or., July 7.—(Special.)—That the Fish and Game Commission intends to pursue a vigorous policy in developing Oregon's resources of special interest to sportsmen is evidenced by arrangements just entered into between Governor Withycombe and California authorities, whereby 100,000 Lake Tahoe trout fry are to be brought here. LONGSHOREMEN'S STRIKE ENDS

The men demanded higher wages and an agreement had recently been reached between union officials and employers for increase of wages without recognition of the union, and the agreement is to be submitted to the Pacific Coast district longshoremen's convention in San Francisco July 26.

Yesterday's walkout was due to a misunderstanding by the men.

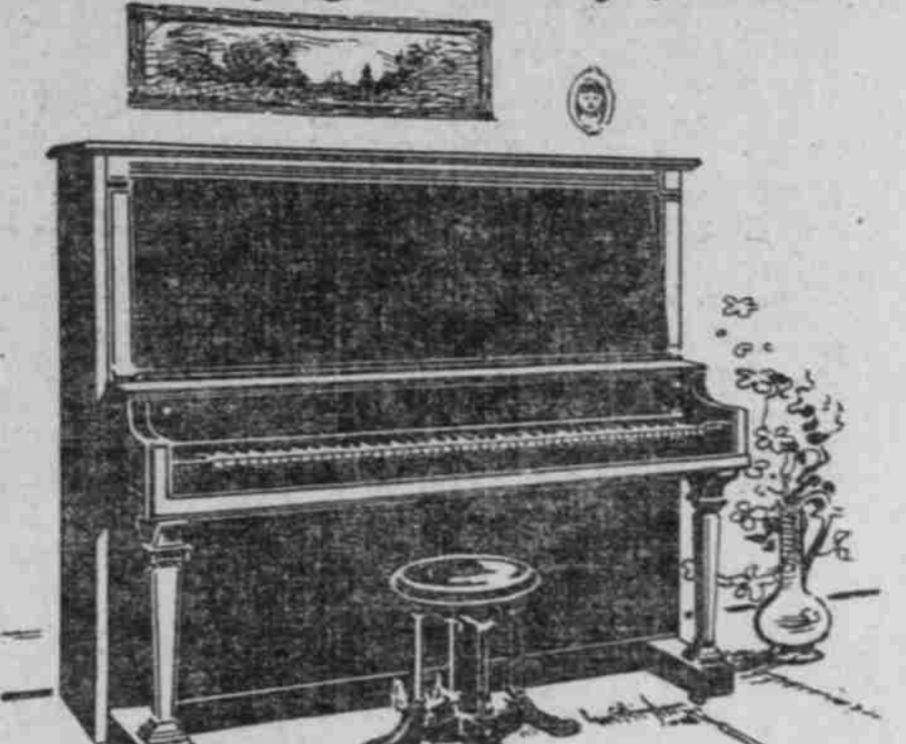
