Portland can well sympathize with "Humpty Dumpty" because our local ball athletes lost two games in one afternoon to Los Angeles yesterday and almost dropped out of the Coast League.

The initial engagement was a pitching battle between Southpaw Lush and "Pop" Perritt. Harry Walter won the game in the eighth inning because of his inability to bunt. McMullen began the faithful stanza by placing a single to left field, with the score 1-1, struck off. Walter tried twice to sacrifice him to second base, and, failing in this, took a healthy wallop at one of Lush's benders and hurled it for two bases into deep right center.

His double scored McMullen and clinched the game. Nearly 4000 fans were out basking in the warm sunshine and everybody enjoyed the initial duel. The other should have been famished. A patent simian and the contrast between the ex-Washingtonian and the ex-Cleveland-Kahler, was almost as sharp as between a cat and a wara warra.

When the tally sheet showed 7-0 in the Angels favor along about the eighth inning, Walter decided to go. Bobby Keefe at the bat. This move seemed to please Earl Maggett immensely because Earl immediately drove one of Robert's pitches into the dry over the right field fence or a home run. Singles by McMullen and Walter and a sacrifice fly added another run, making it 9-0 and half the crowd headed elsewhere.

Portland scored both its runs in the last of the ninth. Observing Captain Speas, as he stepped to bat, he saw wag in the stand shouted out: "The Portland team is now at bat," and this seemed to encourage the boys. He should have holed sooner.

Speas came through with a single to center. Bates batted him along to third by a whopper to tray and was spotted, and both scored on Stump's two-bagger.

Then the lid clanged down like one of those drawbridges they used to have over the moats in "Pop" Dillon's early days.

While Kahler's pitching was not so bad, his work in other departments was hardly in keeping with a big leaguer. Evidently Joe Birmingham never taught Kahler to throw and home in the eighth inning. Ellis finally wormed past Carisch, and, lo and behold, there was a ray of sun at the home-plate to take a hit and Ellis walked over in high glee.

Portland had plenty of chances in both games, but the boys just weren't breaking for them. In the first inning of the second affair the Beavers had the bags full and ready for business when Walter's double permitted himself to slumber off third.

We cite this not as a rap at Doane but merely as evidence of one reason why the champions averaged only 1.6 runs per game during the disastrous series just completed.

Several of the boys surprised themselves by star plays in both games. Ellis pulled one of Speas' drives off the field. Jones in the eighth inning sacrificed. McMullen, Speas, Terry and Bates also negotiated, hair-raising maneuvers.
