

# SEATTLE SHRINERS HOST TO THOUSANDS

Imperial Council Sessions Open Today Amid Merry-making of Throngs.

## TRAFFIC GIVES WAY TO ALL

Gay Streets, Fully Illuminated, Greet Marchers—Great Parade on Entry to City Wins Crowds.

SEATTLE, Wash., July 12.—It is estimated that 50,000 visitors are in Seattle tonight for the 41st annual Imperial Council of the Nobles of the Mystic Shrine. The sessions of the council will begin tomorrow morning in a theater seating 1500 persons while the visitors other than the convention delegates are sightseeing and making merry. All day long there were parades of bands, brilliantly uniformed patrols and Shriners in automobiles between the railroad stations and the Imperial headquarters, where all visiting temples are taken on their arrival. Special trains continued to arrive tonight bearing nobles and their wives and friends.

Second avenue, the principal business street of Seattle, almost gave up other traffic to permit the Shrine bands and patrols to pass to and fro. The downtown streets were almost deserted, and the marching men, and tonight for the first time the fully illuminated streets of Seattle were seen, the streets being as bright as day.

**Philadelphia Temple Wins Crowds.** Tomorrow the 50 temples and 40 bands will march in a great parade, which will move through the principal streets and disband at the convention hall. Lulu Temple, of Philadelphia, with a mounted patrol, was the most popular and, with a band of 180 pieces and two pipe bands, was greatly admired today when its 450 men marched from downtown Seattle.

Next in size among the Eastern temples was Ararat, of Kansas City, with 258 men. Ghiza Temple, of Winnipeg, Manitoba, wore kilts and was led by a bagpipe band. Aladdin Temple, of Columbus O., marched with a band, a patrol and a chorus of 33 voices. Richard Lambert, aged 87, of Jerusalem Temple, New Orleans, is the oldest visiting Shriner.

**Lodge Politics Campaign Begins.** Immediately on arrival the Shriners who have talent for politics began the contest for the office of Imperial outer guard. James E. Chandler, of Kansas City, is stoutly supported by the big delegation from Ararat Temple. There are a dozen other candidates. J. Putnam Stevens, of Kora Temple, Lewiston, Me., now Imperial deputy potentate, becomes Imperial potentate automatically by promotion.

Important matters to come before the council are dispensations for new temples at Manila, Philippine Islands; Houston, Tex., and Knoxville, Tenn. William F. Gault, of Salem, is spokesman for Manila. Galveston is petitioning for the Houston charter and Chattanooga for Knoxville.

Tonight Zurah Temple band, of Minneapolis, gave a concert in Pioneer Place, and Ararat Temple band, of Kansas City, played at the class of 1914. Enormous crowds heard both concerts. The women's quartet of Elzang Temple, Fargo, N. D., sang at the Imperial headquarters and various temples held receptions there. El Mina Temple, of Galveston, gave a watermelon feast at a roof garden.

## BANK CLERK SENTENCED

C. A. DICKEY, OF CORVALLIS, IMPRISONED FOR ONE TO 10 YEARS.

YOUTH GRADUATED FROM OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE IN 1914 ADMITS EMBEZZLING OF \$1400.

CORVALLIS, Or., July 12.—(Special.)—Chester A. Dickey, charged with the embezzlement of \$1400 of the Corvallis State Bank funds, who pleaded guilty in Circuit Court here today and sentenced by Judge Hamilton from one to 10 years in the State Penitentiary.

Dickey was a graduate of the Oregon Agricultural College with the class of 1914. During his time spent at the institution, he was one of the most promising students of his class. Throughout his college career Dickey made friends wherever he went, prominent in class athletics and forensic contests, manager of the 1914 junior annual and major of one of the battalions of cadets.

In the fall of 1914 Dickey entered the employment of the Corvallis State Bank. During the month of February, President Moore noticed something wrong with the books and called attention to them at the time, but during the month of April more evidence was brought to light and Mr. Moore had the books examined by auditors, during which time Dickey left the bank under pretense of being sick and went to Portland.

J. Putnam Stevens, of Portland, Me., past potentate of the Mystic Shrine of Maine, will be elected to the office of imperial potentate when the imperial council, Ancient Arabic Order, Nobles of the Mystic Shrine, hold their annual meeting at Seattle, Wash., today, tomorrow and Thursday. This is the highest office within the gift of the members of the organization and will place Mr. Stevens at the head of all the shrines in the United States, Canada, Mexico and the Hawaiian Islands, which have a total membership of 212,597.

Portland is all ready for a big, patriotic celebration of the visit of the Liberty Bell Thursday morning. Committees on arrangements at the final meeting at the City Hall yesterday considered every detail of the arrangements, including the demonstration for the bell, the big military and children's parade and the entertainment of the public officials from Philadelphia. Portland expects to go other cities visited by the bell one better in its demonstration.

The bell will arrive at 6:30 in the morning at the Union Depot, and will be transferred immediately to the Portland Exchange and placed on the Fourth street and taken to the Fourth-street side of the Courthouse. Here the special car carrying the bell will be parked and kept until uncased. It is expected that the bell will be ready for unvelving by 7 o'clock and will be carried to the site of the parade, which will start at 10 o'clock. Platforms will be erected on both sides for the people to view the bell.

**WAR PROBLEMS SOLVED**  
Soldiers Now Learning Methods of Warfare Are to Entrain Thursday for Portland and Return to Homes Over State.

CAMP JACKSON, Gearhart, Or., July 12.—(Special.)—Arrangements have been completed for the Third Infantry, Oregon National Guard, to escort the Liberty Bell in the parade at Portland Thursday. The parade committee came to Gearhart Sunday to meet Adjutant-General White and details of the plans were worked out last night. Instead of breaking camp Wednesday morning as was the original plan, the troops will spend an extra day in camp and go to Portland on early trains Thursday morning. Wednesday night the permanent camp will be broken, and a bivouac will be made. The horses and squad tents will be shipped Wednesday night.

**Troops Camp on March.** Immediately after the Liberty Bell parade the Salem and Corvallis battalions will enter for Salem, where the Liberty Bell makes a stop of half an hour, and will be in charge of the parade. The return to camp was made after an hour's rest camp was broken and the third battalion was sent out to establish an outpost.

**Soldiers Are Praised.** Companies M, of Salem, and K, of Corvallis, formed the line of outposts, and Major Abrams, battalion commander, was commended highly on the disposition of the companies of his battalion. The return to camp was made at 5:30 o'clock, the cooks having been sent back to camp at an earlier hour and had supper ready when the regiment returned.

Before dismissing their companies the commanding officers complimented the men for their excellent "esprit de corps" and earnestness to make the most of the training that is being given them. During the march a detachment from each company made a map of the country through which the regiment passed.

**Reception Given to Officers.** Tonight is the first time since the regiment has been here that the officers have accepted an invitation to a social function, a reception at the Hotel Moore at Seaside given by Major Dan Moore.

Tomorrow the regiment goes out for a field maneuver, units of the regiment being pitted against each other. Flags signifying to the opposing force the kind of fire that is being delivered, and no company will be allowed to advance unless it has superiority of fire over the outflank force.

In making comparisons it is found that the Woodburn company, I, is the banner company of the Guard. Woodburn, ever since the National Guard was established, has been the best city in the state from a militia standpoint. Company I had 163 men on its muster rolls. Salem and Oregon City, on the other hand, have the smallest number of men on the muster roll. Salem has 55 and Oregon City only 45 men.

**GUNS TAKE TO HIKE**  
Fort Stevens Artillerymen Leave for Two Weeks' Trip.

ASTORIA, Or., July 12.—(Special.)—At 11 o'clock this morning the Ninety-third Company, Coast Artillery Corps, Oregon National Guard, under the command of Captain Leonard Waldron, started on a two weeks' hike across country. The company was conveyed across the river to Knappa, where the march commenced. They will be expected to cross and recross an entire county, will march with 65 pounds of equipment, and will prepare their own rations and camping sites. They will be completely cut off from outside communication and are expected to carry their own food supplies, as if in an enemy's domain.

# ALL CITY PATRIOTIC ARRIVAL OF BELL

Whistles Will Herald Entry to City and Departure Will Follow Big Parade.

## FINAL PLANS COMPLETED

Officials With Bell Will Be Guests on Automobile Trip Immediately After Breakfast—Platforms to Be Used to View Emblem.

**LIBERTY BELL PROGRAMME IN BRIEF.**  
Bell arrives at 6:30 at Union Depot. Arrival will be welcomed by whistles of factories and mills.  
Bell will be moved as rapidly as possible up Fourth street to east side of Courthouse for display.  
Visiting officials will be taken in taxicabs directly to Portland Hotel for breakfast.  
Mayor Albee will make short address of welcome at breakfast begins.  
Visiting officials will be taken for two-hour automobile ride about the city.  
Bell will be opened to view of public from 7 o'clock until afternoon parade.  
Parade of 2000 school children, Oregon National Guard and veteran organizations will start at 10 A. M., passing bell about 10:45.  
Bell will move back to Union Depot about 11:30 and will depart for Vancouver at 12:30.  
Platforms will be erected on both sides of bell from which to view the relic.

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**Special Car Service Arranged.** Arrangements have been made by the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company for special car service on all lines, beginning at 8 A. M., with the regular service of 9 o'clock. An effort will be made to handle the crowds as expeditiously as possible. A large squad of policemen will assist in keeping the people moving so that everyone will have a chance to pass over the platform, provided the parade will start at 10 o'clock.

**Veterans Will Take Part.** The veterans will take part in the parade at 10:30 at a reviewing stand on the south side of Main street, headed by the Oregon National Guard. Here the children's and military parade will pass.

**Parade Arrangements Include an Interesting Procession of School Children, Veterans and the Oregon National Guard.** The National Guard, which is now in camp at Gearhart, will depart for Portland on special trains early Thursday morning, arriving in Portland at about 10 A. M. The entire regiment will fall into line and proceed to Tenth and Yamhill streets, where the parade will start.

**Line of March of Liberty Bell Parade.** The line of march of the Liberty Bell parade, as revised yesterday by the committee, so as not to interfere with stretcher traffic, will be: Form at Tenth street, facing south, head resting on Yamhill street, north to Oak street, south to Taylor, east to Fourth, south over the Liberty Bell platform, west on Main street, west on Main street to Columbia street, south to Columbia street and disperse.

**Parade Will Be at Tenth and Yamhill—Veterans and Children to Take Part.** Instructions relative to the formation and the order of march of the different sections of the parade Thursday morning in honor of the visit of the Liberty Bell were issued yesterday by Adjutant-General George A. **LA GRANDE THRONGS SEE BELL**  
Thousands From Two Counties Visit City for Patriotic Programme.

LA GRANDE, Or., July 12.—(Special.)—Between 10,000 and 12,000 people from Union and Walla Walla counties surged by the Liberty Bell and its consort about 3 o'clock today. The special was a half-hour late reaching the city, and the patriotic programme of songs and speeches was continued over that period. City Manager F. J. Lafky presided, and Circuit Judge Knowles, Rev. Mr. Clark of La Grande, Rev. Mr. Trueblood, of Cove, and Senator Kiddle, of Island City, spoke briefly. Old soldiers carrying their colors marched amid a din of applause to the two platforms from which the bell was viewed.
