Renewed raigs, however, in Kaness and other imperiant sections of the harvest region tended to check the bears. There was no decided upturn, though, previous to the receipt of dispatches from the Northwest that seemed to imply a more serious outlook as to the drended black rost.

Corn was governed theirly by the action of wheat. Rusiness lacked volume.

Despite fairly good sales to the seaboard, oats merely reflected the course of other grain. Constry offerings remained small. Provisions suffered from absence of support. Higher prices for logs were ignored.
