The Oaks (the Coney Island of the West)—Over 50 acres of priceless roses in full bloom, with every form of entertainment and accommodation for tourists. Orchestral and band concerts, prima donna, and musical comedy company every afternoon and night in the open-air theater. Part of the afternoon is free. Admission to park 10 cents. Reached by express special Oaks trains (fare 5 cents), from First and Alder; or by launch (10 cents), from Morrison-street Bridge.
