The facts were called to their attention by Chief Deputy City Auditor Grutze who had the expenditures figured out. However, the conditions were ignored and the levy was cut two-tenths of a mill. This, in addition to the loss of \$300,000 in liquor license revenue, is held responsible for the financial crash which is impending.
