Remonstrators Declared to Represent Only 100 of 6000 Lots Affected By Improvement Proceedings.

To prevent action for the proposed extension of Greeley street from Killingsworth avenue to Russell street a party of remonstrators headed by W. L. Farling appeared before the City Council yesterday morning.

The remonstrators say they were signers of the original petition for the opening of the street and charged that they had been misled into believing that the expense would amount to only about \$7 a lot and also that the car company would put a line on the street, shortening the time required to reach the city center.

Speaking against the proposed extension, W. L. Farling declared that the people along it were not the kind who use a boulevard to any considerable extent. Instead, he said that if there was little possibility of obtaining a street which would be of little benefit to them, he estimated that the extension would cost in the neighborhood of \$20 a lot.

Representatives of the St. Johns Commercial Club spoke in favor of the extension.

Resolutions were adopted providing for the limitation of proceedings for the Montgomery drive from the intersection of 4th block "B" Smith's Addition.
