Kribs, asked Mr. Jones point blank if he had ever been convicted of a crime.

Surprised at the sudden tack events

had taken, Mr. Mannix raised strenu-ous objection to the question, declaring an attorney had no right to impeach his own witness. He was overruled. Mr. Jones was called to the witness stand in his own defense shortly before 5 o'clock.

Witness Relates Convictions.

'At the outset, Mr. Jones," began Mr. Clark. "I have heard it stated around the court that if you took the stand in your own defense in this case you were going to be asked by counsel for the plaintiff whether or not you had ever been convicted of a felony. Now I am going to ask you what the fact is."

"I was convicted twice in the Federal Court," said Mr. Jones deliberately, "in this district for a conspiracy to defraud the Covargament."
