JEWELRY IDENTIFIED AS STOLEN.—Jewelry recognized as stolen from the Adrian Apartments on Tuesday night, was found yesterday to be part of the supposed loot taken from Paul Newman, George Williams, Fred Brooks and George Brown. These four men were arrested Wednesday night by Sergeant Van Over and Patrolman Hunt at the Barr Hotel and jewelry to the value of \$500 was confiscated, for the time being. The police hope to have the remainder of the property identified as stolen and bring burglary charges against the men.

JUDGE M. F. W. BRETHER.—Circuit Judge Robert G. Morrow has entirely recovered from his recent illness and will leave San Francisco for Portland August 12, according to word received yesterday by J. F. Wood, official reporter in Judge Morrow's letter said that he would be in his courtroom again on August 16.

DISTRICT SCHOOL DEBTS HEAVY.—The St. Johns school district, taken into Portland under the recent "expansion amendment," brings the school district No. 1, \$18,000 worth of indebtedness in bonds, according to a statement made at the meeting of the School Board yesterday. Linton school district brings in indebtedness to the amount of \$5100 in promissory notes. These notes probably will be ordered paid immediately by the Board, although most of them do not fall due for a year.

APPEAL MADE FOR CHILD.—What good woman wants to befriend a motherless girl of 13 years? This is the question that Mrs. Margaret Thorburn, head of the benevolent department of the Juvenile Court, is asking. Mrs. Thorburn says the girl is pretty and neat and would like to have a place with a family going to the beach. DEFENDER AIDS 254 IN JULY.—As public defender David Robinson represented during the month of July a total of 254 individuals charged with various violations of city ordinances, according to his report for the past month which has been received by Mayor Albee. These were charged with 25 violations, 111 received continued sentences, 25 punished by fine and imprisonment and four held to answer to the grand jury on felony charges.

VETERANS' PICNIC TOMORROW.—The Oregon Veterans' Association and auxiliary will hold their annual picnic at the Oaks tomorrow. Dinner will be served at noon. Considerable interest has been shown in the lecture by the Portland Birth Control League, recently organized in Portland.

TAX DELEGATES TO VISIT.—Fifty-seven members of the National Tax Association, bound for the National convention in San Francisco August 10-14, will stop in Portland tomorrow and part of Sunday. They will arrive on the Northern Pacific in a special car and will be entertained by the Chamber of Commerce.

BARBERS' UNION IN NEW QUARTERS.—Owing to the fire that destroyed the Alisky building early Wednesday morning the barbers' union has had to seek new quarters. Yesterday the union succeeded in locating in the Spalding building and will be found temporarily in room 709.

DR. J. W. McDUGALL TO CONDUCT.—Dr. J. W. McDougall, district superintendent of the Methodist Church, will preside at the community sing that will constitute the Sunday evening service at the Rose City Park Methodist Church. This will be an outdoor meeting.

BUREAU SEEKS 1000 HOPKICKERS.—The free employment bureau of the Government have been "subsidized" by the hopgrowers in the Willamette Valley to aid in the search for pickers. One thousand pickers are needed by the growers and notices of the opportunity for employment are being sent out by the inspector in charge of the immigration service. Applications will be received by the inspector, Mr. Bonham, at his office in the Railway Exchange building.

GIRLS TO SHOW MILLINERY.—Marking the close of the six weeks' vacation, teachers and pupils of the Girls' School of Trades have arranged an exhibit of millinery and dressmaking, from 12 to 1 o'clock today. The exhibit will be in the rooms of the girls' school at Fourteenth and Morrison streets in the old Lincoln High School building. A number of creations in millinery and dressmaking models will be shown.

MUNICIPAL COURT RECEIPTS \$2327.—The Municipal Court took in a total of \$2327.25 during the month of July, according to the report received by Judge Stevenson which was received by Mayor Albee yesterday. The sum of \$2406.25 was received in fines, \$109 in forfeitures and \$12 in costs. Fines were paid by 245 violators.

VEHICLE RULES ANNOUNCED

Jitney Inspector Gallup Lays Down

Laws for Traffic Guidance.

Jitney Inspector Gallup declared yesterday that there was much misunderstanding among auto drivers as to the law providing for the right of way. Some he said contended that vehicles going north and south have it, but that is erroneous.

"Section 5 C of the traffic ordinance, which can be obtained at police headquarters and at room 204, City Hall, says: 'When approaching a street intersection all vehicles approaching on right of driver have right of way on equal distance at intersections.'"

Mr. Gallup also gave several other rules which he said were of importance in preventing accidents.

"Don't cut over street before turning to left."

"Don't pass streetcar on the left when approaching car from rear at streetcar intersections."

"Don't fail to give unmistakable signals by the use of the hand when turning to left and also when stopping."

NEW ROAD TO BE VISITED

Southern Pacific Manager's Aide to

Inspect Eugene-Marshfield Work.

D. W. Campbell, assistant general manager of the Southern Pacific, left yesterday on the steamer Breakwater for Coos Bay, where he will inspect the work in progress on the new railroad being built by the Southern Pacific Company from Eugene to Marshfield. He was accompanied by Ralph E. Moody, attorney for the company, and Dr. Younger, assistant superintendent.

F. L. Burkhalter, superintendent, will leave tomorrow night on an overnight trip to Coos Bay. He will go to the end of the new line by rail and proceed then by stage to Marshfield. The entire party will return to Portland by rail early next week.

Mr. Campbell is eager to have the maximum amount of construction work completed before the rainy weather sets in next fall. It is expected that the road will be open and ready for operation from Eugene to Coos Bay early next May.

FALL FATAL TO GIRL

Miss Virginia Burns Dies After Accident When Swinging.

FUNERAL WILL BE TODAY

Death of Popular Young Member of Well-Known Family Results Unexpectedly, Following Signs of Recovery.

From injuries received Tuesday in a fall from a swing, Miss Virginia Burns, youngest daughter of Walter J. Burns, resident manager of Balfour, Guthrie & Co., died at her home at 3 o'clock yesterday morning. The funeral will be held at 4 o'clock today at the family residence, 123 North Nineteenth street. Bishop Walter Taylor Sumner will officiate, assisted by Rev. J. E. H. Simpson, rector of St. Mark's.

Miss Burns, who was 18 years old and a favorite in the younger set, was to have made her debut in society next fall.

Death was unexpected, as the girl had shown signs of improvement Wednesday, and was due, probably, according to the physicians in attendance, to a delayed hemorrhage.

Injury First Thought Slight.
 The accident occurred at the home of L. B. Menefee, of the L. B. Menefee Lumber Company, on Portland Heights. Tuesday afternoon, as Miss Burns was swinging with P. L. Menefee, son of Mr. Menefee. Their combined weight on a swing intended for children broke the sawways holding one of the ropes and both were precipitated to the ground. They were nearly 12 feet in the air when the accident happened. Miss Burns struck on one shoulder and was rendered unconscious. Mr. Menefee was uninjured.

The injuries were not considered serious at the time, and Miss Burns was removed to her home that afternoon at 5 o'clock. Dr. Holt C. Wilson, an uncle of the girl, was called.

Miss Burns passed an easy night and showed distinct signs of improvement the next day. Early yesterday the laboring breathing of the girl alarmed the family and Dr. George Wilson was summoned, his brother being out of the city. Miss Burns passed away before he arrived.

Miss Burns attended St. Helen's Hall and Miss Catlin's school in Portland, and had just returned from two years at Westover School. She was planning to enter Miss Finch's school in New York in a few months.

Funeral Date Changed.
 In June of this year Miss Burns accompanied her father and mother south, spending a month at San Francisco and Del Monte.

Surviving are her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Walter J. Burns; five sisters and one brother—Mrs. Thomas Robertson, Mrs. L. Hawley Hoffman (Caroline Burns), Mrs. Charles H. Davis, Jr. (Anita Burns), and Miss Louise Burns, of Portland; Mrs. George E. Wilson, of New York (Georgianna Burns), and W. J. (Jack) Burns, Jr., of Portland.

Mesdames Davis, Robertson and Hoffman were at their summer homes at Gearhart when the accident occurred. Uncles and aunts of Miss Burns, on her mother's side, residing in Portland, are Dr. George Wilson, Miss Clementine Wilson, Mrs. S. B. Lanthicum and Bruce Wilson. Her cousins include Mrs. Gerald Beebe (Carolyn Wilson), Mrs. George Gordon (Evelyn Wilson) and Mrs. Gordon Forbes (Frances Wilson).

The funeral was originally announced for Saturday at 10 o'clock, but was changed last night to this afternoon at 4 o'clock.

WAR WRITER IS SOUGHT

SHORTAGE FOUND IN ACCOUNTS OF GERMAN PUBLISHING COMPANY.

E. J. Makdyck, former bookkeeper, posing as Austrian officer, is being searched for.

Following the discovery of a shortage of \$1500 to \$2000 in the cash accounts of the German Publishing Company, authorities throughout the West are looking for "Count" E. J. Makdyck, who was employed for a time as bookkeeper, and who also wrote special war articles for the German weekly newspaper. Makdyck posed as a lieutenant in the Austrian army and as a military expert. He said he was a Hungarian of noble descent.

Deputy Constable C. R. Nicholson has sent circulars to authorities in all parts of the West since three weeks ago, when Makdyck dropped out of sight.

New England Newspapers Are Sending Party to Exposition at San Francisco.

New England beauties—119 of them—the pick of the most beautiful girls of the rock-ribbed coast of the far north New England states and part of Canada, will be in Portland today.

They will arrive this afternoon at 2:15 o'clock from Seattle and will be met by a delegation from the Chamber of Commerce.
