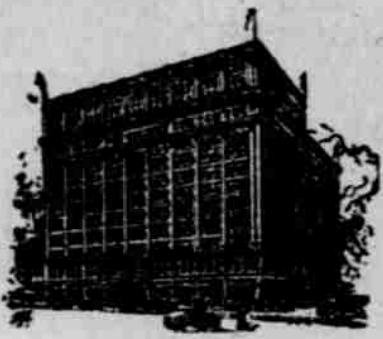

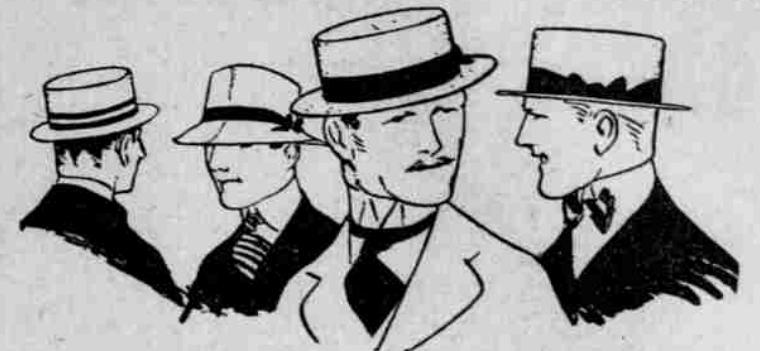

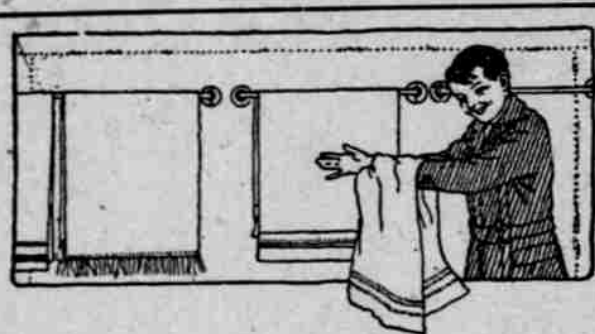

## WOMEN ACCUSE HEIR

Destruction of Clothing Laid to Youth Worth Millions.

### FEDERAL OFFICERS STEP IN

M. H. Black, Freed on One Charge, Faces Another of Using Mails in Scheme to Defraud—Mother to Pay for Damage Done.

A nephew of ex-Mayor Hooper, of Baltimore, an heir to an estate rated in the millions, but possessed with a destructive mania for the modern feminine apparel, M. H. Black, aged 22, was in Municipal Court yesterday on a charge of trespass. He was accused of entering the suite of Misses Moille and Jennie Smith, in the Villa St. Clair Apartments, at Twelfth and Taylor streets, and slashing to ribbons clothing he found there.

A plea of guilty was entered and sentence was pronounced upon the promise of his mother, Mrs. E. H. Black, to reimburse the young women, who just returned from San Francisco, for all the damage done.

### CITY WILL SELL ITS JUNK

Method Adopted to Aid in Relieving Stringency in Finances.

As a method of assisting in relieving the stringency in the city finances, several hundred tons of junk of various kinds, gathered from the different departments and bureaus, the accumulation of years, will be sold at auction today and tomorrow by City Purchasing Agent Wood.

Mr. Wood will conduct three auction sales today. One of these will be at East Seventh and East Alder streets at 10 o'clock, another at the municipal shop at the foot of East Washington street at 11, and the third at the warehouse at the head of Jefferson street at 2.

### LODGE BUILDING OPPOSED

Mr. Baker to Ask Delay in Benson Park Improvement.

Commissioner George L. Baker, of the Department of Public Affairs, will submit a resolution at the meeting of the Council Wednesday, recommending that all bids for the construction of the proposed lodge and comfort station at Benson Park be rejected. W. B. Smith and O. H. Hilt submitted the lowest bid, which was \$280.

### STREET PAVING PROTESTED

Council to Act on Petition Against East Thirteenth Improvement.

A petition remonstrating against the improving of East Thirteenth street, North between Alberta street and Roselawen avenue, by putting in macadam pavement was filed yesterday. The petition, signed by S. F. D. Sorenson and 24 other property owners, will come up before the City Council tomorrow.

## DODGE SUIT PROLONGED

ATTORNEY FOR PLAINTIFF BEGINS ORATORICAL MARATHON.

"Opening Argument" Explaining Timber Deal Lasts From 9:30 in Morning to 4:30 P. M.

Arguments of attorneys in the \$614,000 timberland suit of the creditors of E. H. Dodge against Frederick A. Kribs and Willard N. Jones yesterday developed into an oratorical marathon. Thomas Mannix, the plaintiff's attorney, talked to Judge Kavanaugh (there is no jury, so all the oratory is directed at Judge Kavanaugh alone) from 9:30 A. M. until 4:30 P. M. with two hours out for lunch. When he started in to explain the timber deal to the Judge, Mr. Mannix was fresh, wore a flower in his buttonhole and his hair was neatly combed. At 4:30 P. M. his coat had been discarded, a handkerchief was tucked in the front of his collar, his hair was tousled and he was reeking perspiration.

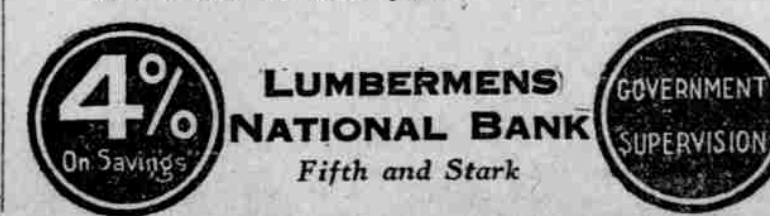
## MRS. SELLWOOD DIES
