Germans Checked Near Riga.

A dispatch to the Geneva Tribune from Innsbruck, Austria, says that in the recent fighting near Riga, the forces of the eastern front, running from the Pissa River to Ostrow, northeast of Warsaw, the Germans lost 65,000 men in killed or wounded, and succeeded in capturing the principal fortified positions of the Russians.

Hostages Are Taken.

"Inhabitants of Warsaw: Your city is in German hands, but we wage war only against hostile troops, not against peaceful citizens. Peace and order shall be preserved and rights protected. I expect no successful success to undertake no hostile action, to trust German sense and justice and obey the instructions of German command."

MOTHER'S PART IN GREAT WAR TRAGIC

Carolyn Wilson Tells of Bereavement Typical of Suffering of France.

SEVEN SONS ARE STRICKEN

Six Killed in Action, Seventh Is Blinded and Driven Insane by Shock—Woman Literally Has Given all to Country.

I suppose it is no more nor less the story of a hundred thousand homes. Grief and sorrow and death are common denominators of war and the mother I am going to tell you about probably has suffered no more than the other million mothers and wives scattered over this cruelly tried country.

CHINESE BLAMES LAW

EXCLUSION ACT IN AMERICA IS CONDEMNED BY SPEAKER. Credit is Given United States as Only Great Power Which Has Not Abused China.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 10.—The United States was declared to be the only one of the great nations which was not abusing China by Speaker Charles Clegg of the House of Representatives at the Panama-Pacific Exposition, in an address tonight before the International Immigration Commission. He condemned, however, the Chinese exclusion act as an unjust law, a breach of treaty and the only possible cause of friction between the two countries.

COQUILLE BOND ISSUE ATTACHED.

MARSHFIELD, Or., Aug. 10.—(Special.)—The City of Coquille, voted for the purpose of retiring a warrant indebtedness, was attached in Denver at the United States National Bank, of this city, by J. M. Wright & Co., of Denver. The bonds were sold finally to Sweet, Casey & Foster, of Denver. Mr. Wright & Co. had purchased the bonds a year ago, but insisted on so many technicalities the city withdrew from the sale and afterwards issued the bonds to the other company. The J. M. Wright company made a claim of \$800 for legal services and \$1800 for damages against the city for not selling the bonds to it, as agreed.

6000-TON STEAMER CONTRACT LET.

SEATTLE, Wash., Aug. 10.—The contract for the construction of a 6000-ton steel steamer for the New York & Cuba Mail Steamship Company, generally known as the Ward line, was awarded today to the Seattle Construction & Drydock Company, and the ship will be built in the yards here. The vessel will be 368 feet long, and will ply between New York and the West Indies.

SHIP SAILS WITH RAILS FOR ALASKA.

SEATTLE, Aug. 10.—The steamer Seward sailed for Anchorage, Cook Inlet, today, with 600 tons of heavy steel rails and 1,500,000 feet of lumber for the Government railroad. The rails will be used for construction of four miles of yard tracks at Anchorage. The lumber will construct bridges along the Matanuska River.

GERMANS TO INCREASE FOOD PORTIONS.

BERLIN, Aug. 10, by wireless to Tuckerton, N. J.—"The Minister of the Interior of the Grand Duchy of Baden," says a message from Karlsruhe to the Overseas News Agency, "has decided with the Socialist deputies, to announce that good crops soon would permit of an increase in bread portions and of decreases in prices."

NEW GROUND GAINED BY ALLEES IN TURKEY

"Substantial Progress" and Landings at Two Further Points Reported.

OTTOMANS BEATEN OFF

French Co-operate Heartily With British in Renewed Offensive. Many Prisoners, Much Material Captured.

LONDON, Aug. 10.—Troops of the entente allies in the Dardanelles made a gain of 200 yards on a front of 300 yards east of the Krithia road on the Gallipoli Peninsula. It was officially announced here today. A footing also has been gained on Chunuk Bair and another landing effected elsewhere, the statement adds. The official report says: "Sir Ian Hamilton reports that fighting at several points on the Gallipoli Peninsula has taken place during the last few days. Substantial progress has been made. "In the southern zone 200 yards on a front of 300 yards has been gained east of the Krithia road, and has been held in spite of determined counter-attacks, which have been repulsed with heavy losses on the enemy. Repeated attacks by the Turks elsewhere in this zone were beaten off. "Several attacks by French corps have been made and their whole-hearted co-operation has proved of the greatest assistance. "In the Anzac zone a footing in the Chumuk Bay position of Sari Bair also has been gained, and the crest occupied after fierce fighting, and the successful storming of strongly held positions. "Turkish Loss Is Large. "Here, too, the enemy's loss has been considerable. The advance was begun at night under cover of a searchlight from the enemy. "Elsewhere a fresh landing has been successfully made, and considerable progress made. "Six hundred and thirty prisoners have been taken, together with one Nordenfeldt, two bomb mortars, nine machine guns and a large number of small arms. It is estimated that 2000 of the enemy's rifles, ammunition and equipment."

BEND FRANCHISE LOST

EFFORT AT LIGHT POWER COMPETITION IS VOTED DOWN.

People Uphold Action Taken by Mayor on Measure That Was Passed Over His Veto.

BEND, Or., Aug. 10.—(Special.)—By a vote of 239 to 219 the people of Bend yesterday defeated the electric franchise sought by Steidl & Sweet in competition with the Bend Water, Light & Power Company. The franchise first was passed by the City Council in March by a vote of five to one. The franchise was vetoed by Mayor Miller and later passed over his veto. The referendum then was invoked, with the defeat resulting at the counting of the ballots. At the Council meeting last night to canvass the franchise his company now felt its way clear to proceed with extensions and improvements required by the future development of the town. Interest in the election ran high. Aside from its bearing on immediate development plans, the result is considered a vindication of Councilman Caldwell, who voted against the franchise in the Council, and of Mayor Miller, who vetoed it. Mr. Brown also said that as a result of the defeat of the franchise his company now felt its way clear to proceed with extensions and improvements required by the future development of the town. Interest in the election ran high. Lewis Power Franchise Refused. CENTRALIA, Wash., Aug. 10.—(Special.)—The Lewis County Commissioners have denied the petition of H. G. Fleischhauer, of Portland, former manager of the Washington-Oregon Corporation, for a franchise to construct and maintain power lines over certain county roads from the south limits of Centralia to the town of Vader. Mr. Fleischhauer had posted \$20,000 bond with Centralia as a guarantee of service by October 1.

SOLDIERS' HOME FUND \$15,215.

OLYMPIA, Wash., Aug. 10.—(Special.)—The State of Washington has received \$15,215.09 from the National Home for Volunteer Soldiers as a contribution toward the support of the two Washington soldiers' homes for the current quarter. The National Home remits a contribution every quarter. The money will be divided between the Veterans' Home at Port Orchard and the Soldiers' Home at Orting.
