Bravery Medal Returned

Dr. Hegeler Gives Award to Family of William Whitcomb.

The bravery medal found recently by Dr. H. W. Hegeler has been returned to relatives of the late William Whitcomb, to whom the award was made in 1854 for bravery and courage in the

rescue of the crew on the schooner M. L. Hall, at Glades Head, off the Massachusetts coast, May 20 that year. The story of Dr. Hegeler's "find" was related in The Oregonian last Sunday, and was the grandson of the late Mr. Whitcomb and several friends of the family made themselves known. Dr. Hegeler, yesterday, turned the medal over to W. H. Whitcomb, who lives at Courtney Station, who revealed the fact that the widow of the late Mr. Whitcomb still lives in Portland, at 215 Glenn avenue, with a daughter, Mrs. F. M. Rowley. The story of Mr. Whitcomb's bravery in rescuing the crew of the wrecked schooner has become family history, and is frequently a topic of conversation, according to the younger Mr. Whitcomb. Mrs. J. C. Luckey, of 460 Elm street, is another who threw light on the history of the medal. Mrs. Luckey was a friend of the Whitcombs in Situate.

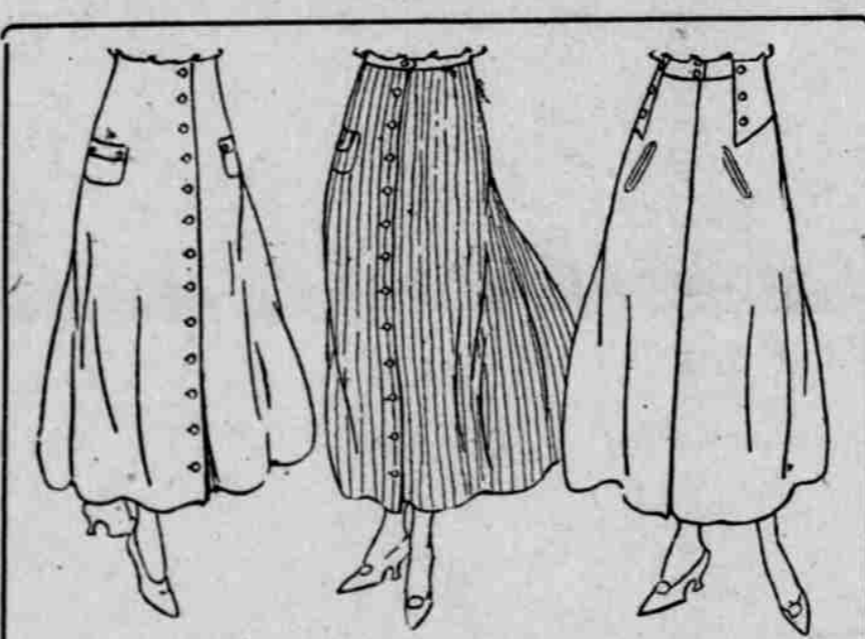

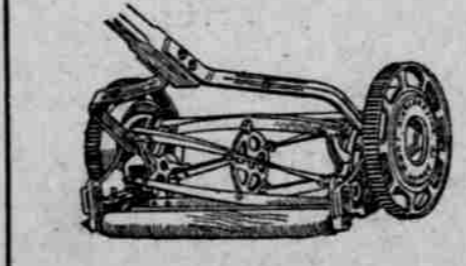
