Cashier Patents Held Valid by Lawyer, Witness Says, Explaining Details.

INVENTOR IS EXONERATED

Thomas Bilyeu Had Nothing to Do With Stock Sales Is Testimony. Transactions of Company Discussed in Detail.

For the fourth successive day Frank Menefee continued to testify in his own behalf before Federal Judge Bean Tuesday in the United States Cashier Company trial.

RUSSIA TIGHTENS PASSPORT RULES

The new requirements provide that besides an authenticating photograph, the bearer of a passport must have a statement as to whether he holds citizenship by birth or naturalization.

O'Hara, 714 Overton street, on Sunday at the age of 73 years, was held at St. Patrick's church at Nineteenth and Savier streets. Interment was in Mount Calvary cemetery.

COACH CASE RULING NEAR

Cos Court Soon to Pass on Heir's Plea to Remove Guardian.

MARSHFIELD, Or., Aug. 11.—(Special.)—A decision by Judge Watson, of the County Court, is expected soon in the suit of Arthur Coach in which Mr. Joseph, heir of the late Joseph Coach's heirs asks to be relieved from the guardianship of his sister, Mrs. Leo J. Cary, of Coquille. The guardianship was assumed by Mrs. Cary when her husband died and she was an incompetent. The Coach estate consists of timberlands estimated to be worth from \$200,000 to \$350,000.

ARMENIANS IN FLIGHT

MASSACRE OF 10,000 BY KURDS IS LATE REPORT.

Refugees Now Total 60,000 and Another Christian Exodus From Persia is Feared. TIFLIS, Transcaucasia, via Petrograd and London, Aug. 11.—The Armenian bishop has received information that 60,000 Armenian refugees have arrived at Igdir, the principal outlet of the vilayet of Van. It is expected that fully 100,000 will be driven from Van alone, and another exodus of Christians from Persia is feared.

MOVIE APPEAL LAW IS UP

Proposed Ordinance on Censorship Submitted to Chamber Committee.

The ordinance proposed by the motion picture theater managers as a substitute to the movie censor law was submitted to the executive committee of the Chamber of Commerce Tuesday, together with the old ordinance, and has been referred to the committee of the Chamber, with power to act. The motion picture men are asking the Chamber to back them in fight for abolition of the censor board of appeals from the decisions of the censors, which they say are becoming more and more arbitrary, since the old board of appeals was abolished.

Washington Reticent, in Belief That News Reaching Carranza's Capital Would Make Situation More Difficult.

The dead man was one of four soldiers guarding Palm Garden. The bandits appeared suddenly in the darkness and fired on the guards. Their shots were replied to, but the result is unknown here.

COMPLAINT IS DISMISSED

Railroad Companies Put End to Coal Rate Controversy.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, Aug. 11.—At the request of both parties, the Interstate Commerce Commission today dismissed the complaints of excessive freight charges on railroad rates of coal from Washington points to Salem, Or., made against the Southern Pacific Company by the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company. The power company alleged that the rate of \$3.04 should not be more than \$2.04, and asked reparation in \$1500 on account of excessive charges.
