PROTECTION WALL PROPOSED.—Construction of a retaining wall in front of the property of Mrs. J. A. Kraenick on East Twenty-ninth street, near Clinton, is to be paid for by the district surrounding. It is proposed by Commissioner Dick as a means of solving the problem of protecting Mrs. Kraenick's property from damage by reason of the improvement of East Twenty-ninth street south of Clinton. Mrs. Kraenick complained that the improvement would ruin her property. Commissioner Dick says the only means of solving the problem is to build the retaining wall and to assess the cost to adjacent property owners along with the assessment for the general improvement.

MAN SUES BROTHER FOR ALLEGED LIES.—Otto Ganguin yesterday filed suit for \$5000 against his brother Max Ganguin, alleging that false reports had been circulated against him. Both brothers are engaged in the business of buying and slaughtering them for the local market. Several months ago, according to Otto, they had a misunderstanding. Since that time, Otto says, Max has deliberately informed all of their old customers that his brother was not fair in his business dealings.

RIDGE CARPENTERS' DUE.—Only for carpenters have filed application to take the city's civil service examination next Tuesday for bridge carpenters. A long list of applicants had been expected. Time for filing applications for the examination expires at noon today. From the successful applicants appointments of the city's bridge carpenters will be made. An examination will be held Tuesday, August 24, for pump and stationary engineers.

WOMAN'S ASSAULT SENTENCED.—On a charge of attack upon a crippled woman, Ed Elaven was sentenced by Acting Municipal Judge Stadter yesterday morning to three months imprisonment and to pay a fine of \$200. He had beaten Mrs. C. Carroll, a cripple of 24 Madison street, several days ago. This was the same woman he attacked less than a year ago, for which he then was sentenced to 90 days imprisonment.

GRANTS PASS NEWSPAPERMAN VISITS.—Thomas P. Hanley, well-known newspaperman of Grants Pass, Or., has been passing his vacation in the city, mostly at the ball game. Company has arranged for a 24-minute car service on both the Sunnyside and Montaville lines and will have sufficient number of cars to care for the crowds after the concert. An effort will be made to give thoroughly adequate car service.

A large area of lawn will be available for those unable to get bench seats. This is the first time Portland has had such an affair as this with a world-famous singer as a feature. Mrs. J. M. Judd, who is in Portland on tour, was invited by Commissioner Baker to give a concert. She agreed to the plan, immediately saying that she would be glad to sing because of the many courtesies shown her here. After looking over all the parks she selected Laurelhurst as the most desirable for a musical event of this kind.

CITY CUTS WOOD PRICE

\$4.50 A CORD SET AS MINIMUM FOR MUNICIPAL FUEL.

Council Passes Emergency Ordinance to Meet Figure of Private Dealers.

—Loss of \$7500 Indicated.

Although a price of \$5 a cord was decided on recently as an ironclad figure for the city's supply of cordwood now being offered for sale, the Council yesterday passed an emergency ordinance cutting the price to \$4.50. The action was taken after solicitors went out and found it almost impossible to get orders at \$5 while private concerns are selling for \$4.50 a cord.

The whole secret of the sudden change in front on the part of the Commission is the need of funds. The city has close to \$75,000 tied up in its woodpile, and has been counting upon this amount as a cash asset in the available funds for the present year. Sale is necessary unless the city pays some of its bills with wood along toward the end of the year.

The plan originally was to hold the wood at \$5 a cord for the effect it would have on keeping the private dealers' prices down to \$4.50. Now it is a case of selling the wood. The ordinance was introduced by Commissioner Bigelow. He says one solicitor in two days of hard work was able only to get orders for 10 cords of wood. The purchasing agent is being hauled now to the city's storage yard and from there is being reloaded under order and is being delivered. The rehandling, he says, costs about 75 cents a cord. He says the city can afford to deliver direct from the wood camps at \$4.50 a cord better than it can stand the additional 75 cents for rehandling and hauling.

The ordinance as passed provides that the purchasing agent shall have power to sell the wood as he deems fit at not less than \$4.50 a cord with an additional charge of 10 cents for each half mile of delivery beyond the first half mile from Twenty-ninth and Raleigh streets. The purchasing agent is authorized in the ordinance to buy what apparatus is needed to handle the wood and to engage such men as are necessary to get orders and saw the wood.

The cut in price means that the city loses heavily on its wood. It has been estimated that the wood as produced last winter by the unemployed cost the city about \$5.25 a cord. The loss of 75 cents on each cord means a total loss for the 10,000 cords produced, of \$7500.

CAPTAIN GOETHALS VISITS

Son of Panama Canal Builder Stops Here, En Route East.

Captain George P. Goethals, son of Major-General George Goethals, the builder of the Panama Canal, was a Portland visitor yesterday. Accompanied by Mrs. Goethals, he was en route to West Point, where he is now stationed, having visited the California expositions. Captain Goethals was for five years stationed in the Canal Zone during the construction period.

Captain and Mrs. Goethals left last night for the East, and will go through Yellowstone Park.
