

KELLY MUST STAY IN RECALL CONTEST

Election Eve Withdrawal in
Wheeler Void, According
to Court Precedent.

NAME TO BE ON BALLOT

Opponent of J. K. Starr May Resign
if Successful and Governor
Would Appoint Another to
Fill the Vacancy.

SALEM, Or., Aug. 15.—(Special.)—Although Thomas R. Kelly has withdrawn from the race for District Attorney in the recall election in Wheeler County tomorrow, as the result of the shooting of Peter Hoffer by Marshal Shaughnessy, of Mitchell, his name will appear upon the ballot.

Should he defeat J. K. Starr, the incumbent, according to court ruling heretofore, he will be the District Attorney. Should he not wish to serve he could resign, but Mr. Starr would not retain the office. In that case it would be the duty of the Governor to appoint an official.

The ballots have been printed and Mr. Kelly cannot legally withdraw from the race, although he has announced that he is out of the contest. Lawyers here say if Mr. Starr should lose on the first question on the ballot, which is "Should J. K. Starr be recalled?" even though he received more votes than Mr. Kelly, he would be ousted from office and it will be the duty of the Governor to appoint his successor.

Attorney-General Brown says that inasmuch as he might be asked to give an official opinion he would not express himself on the status of Mr. Starr at this time. Secretary of State Olcott also declined to make a statement other than that Mr. Kelly's name would appear on the ballot as in similar cases heretofore.

RECALL CANDIDATE QUILTS RACE

T. R. Kelly Announces Shooting by
Marshal Prompts Decision.

FOSSIL, Or., Aug. 15.—(Special.)—Thomas R. Kelly, opponent of District Attorney J. K. Starr in the campaign for Mr. Starr's recall, has announced his withdrawal on the eve of the election, which is set for tomorrow. This leaves Mr. Starr without an opponent. In case the people vote to recall Mr. Starr, and Mr. Kelly, even if elected, declines to qualify, the office of District Attorney for Wheeler County will be left vacant. It is generally supposed that the Governor would appoint a successor to serve until the next regular election, under these circumstances.

Mr. Kelly gives as his reason for withdrawing from the contest at this time the shooting of Peter Hoffer by Constable P. J. Shaughnessy at Mitchell last Friday. The notice of withdrawal follows:

Fossil, Or., Aug. 15.—To the Voters of Wheeler County: I hereby withdraw as a candidate for the office of District Attorney at the election to be held August 16.

I do so on account of the unfortunate affair at Mitchell, where Constable P. J. Shaughnessy shot and killed Peter Hoffer by Marshal P. J. Shaughnessy, which I most sincerely regret.

I am informed that Marshal Shaughnessy is the man who circulated the recall petition in Wheeler County, and had been heard of Mr. Shaughnessy before I came here, and have never communicated with him before or since. I do not wish to be understood as wishing to cast any discredit upon Mr. Shaughnessy. I simply wish it to be understood that he had nothing to do with my coming here or my entering the race for the office of District Attorney. I alone am responsible for that.

As a newswoman in the country I do not feel that I can in the bitter strife that culminated in the sad affair of today, therefore I request you do not vote for me in Monday's election. Very respectfully yours,

TURCOS EAT AT NIGHT

French Facilitate Observance of Annual Muslim Fast.

PARIS, Aug. 15.—The Turkish-Algerian riflemen and other soldiers of the Mohammedan faith from other parts of Africa serving in the French army now drink their coffee at sunset, take their lunch 20 minutes later and have their dinner at midnight. This turning of night into day is the consequence of the Ramadan, the annual fast of the Muslims, extending over a period of a month from July 12 to August 12, during which he abstains from food and drink every day between dawn and sunset.

Following the rule established last year, to respect the religious feasts of all soldiers in the French army and facilitate their observance, the Minister of War ordered that the commissary department furnish supplies to the Mohammedan soldiers in accordance with their traditions.

HUNTER IS SHOT IN HEAD

Charge Fired From Distance of 50 Feet Wounds McMinnville Man.

McMINNVILLE, Or., Aug. 15.—(Special.)—Edward Barry, a rancher, 32 years old, was shot in the head accidentally today by John Moullet while they were hunting in the hills 10 miles west of here. About two dozen shot struck Mr. Barry. The charge was fired from a distance of 50 feet.

The injured man was brought here and Dr. E. E. Goucher removed the shot. The physician said that the shot was small and saved Mr. Barry from being killed. It is thought he will recover. He is married and the father of two children.

Rancher Bitten by Rabid Dog.

FRENCHTON, Or., Aug. 15.—(Special.)—Bitten on the hand by a rabid dog in his sheep camp at Meacham, Thomas T. Edwards, of this city, has returned to his home here for treatment. Physicians have sent for a serum to prevent the development of hydrophobia.

The dog was bitten three weeks ago by a rabid coyote. After attacking Edwards it escaped into the timber, but was shot later.

Lebanon School Opening Set.

LEBANON, Or., Aug. 15.—(Special.)—The Lebanon public school will open September 20, with a full corps of teachers. Superintendent Thaddeus has returned from taking a course at the Summer school in Berkeley, and plans are laid for a profitable school year.

RAFFLES IS TAKEN

H. G. Hanson Is Accused of 15
Robberies in Few Months.

THIEF IN EX-MAYOR'S SUIT

Reported Loss of Foodstuffs and
Discovery of Some Goods Near
River Cues That Lead to
Houseboats—Confession Made.

and other foodstuffs had been taken, leading the detectives to believe that the man was not a North End "foster," but a man keeping a house.

Two weeks ago the trail was picked up again, when at the robbery of the home of George H. Crawford, 1425 East Nineteenth street, neighbors were able to furnish to Detectives La Salle and Leonard a description of the man that had been seen hanging about the residence previous to the burglary.

Convinced that the man was making his home on one of the houseboats, the detectives began an inquiry at the moorage, beginning at the Oaks. Finally a man answering the description was located at moorage at the foot of Crampton street. Saturday the officers were certain of their man, and yesterday morning, shortly before 10 o'clock, Detectives Leonard, La Salle, Royle and John Moloney swooped down upon the houseboat in a launch. Hanson had a powerful motorboat, the Elinda, moored there, but could not escape, as the detectives had the place surrounded.

Silver and Gems Not Found.

Innocence was protested at first, but as the detectives began to uncover goods stored in the houseboat, Hanson finally confessed that he had stolen them. The quantity of goods taken astounded the detectives, and when they were taken to police headquarters and identification began to be made. Acting Detective Captain Pat Moloney declared that he believed the most dangerous burglar loose in Portland had been captured.

The most valuable jewels, clothing and silverware had been disposed of already. The police hope to trace some of it, but all of it was shipped out of the state, none being disposed of at Portland shops.

Love of Thrills Blamed.

"It was the excitement I loved," said Hanson yesterday. "I really never made much money from what I stole. I was usually working and never expected to become rich by stealing. It was fun, though. I used to get pretty nervous when I first entered a house, but soon got over that."

"Would I have shot if interrupted at work? I never carried a gun. I had one at home, but when out on a job I never carried it. I don't mind stealing, but I wouldn't like to hurt anyone."

Hanson smiled. It was a hearty,

pleasing smile, a smile that wins friends.

Catch Often Established.

"What did I do when I made a big haul? I often had more than I could carry conveniently to my home. In that case I would find some place to cache it and go back for it later. Once I went back to my cache and found nothing there. I never heard of the property being recovered, so I guess someone else helped themselves."

Hanson is 32 years old. He says he has lived in Portland four years. He was angry at the accusations of the detectives toward Mrs. Malm.

"She had nothing to do with any of my robberies," he declared positively.

Asked if she was his sister—since the detectives asserted that she was not—he answered, "Yes," but smiled.

Shoes Declared Stolen.

Mrs. Malm, say the detectives, is the woman who, the day following a robbery, took a new pair of shoes to Lipman, Wolfe & Company and demanded that they be changed for a size larger, as they did not fit. They were changed, and it was afterward found that they had been stolen the night previous.

The thief working last winter showed a curious propensity for women's clothing, and while many handsome coats and gowns were taken, common dresses also formed part of the loot. This led the police to believe that a woman was a confederate of the burglar, if she was not actually a burglar herself. Traces of a woman's presence were left at several houses that had been robbed.

The most valuable articles stolen have not been recovered yet. From the home of Judge Bean an evening suit, blue serge suit and a platinum watch were among the articles taken. These were among Hanson's loot.

Necklace Is Recovered.

A kodak stolen from the George H. Crawford residence was identified. From the Heitkamp home a platinum necklace set with a diamond, an Elk pin, a cameo brooch, a watch, a wedding ring and table linen were all recovered.

Most of the clothing taken from the Anderson home has been identified among the Hanson effects, a creamer, spoons and other silverware has been recognized as coming from the Boos residence.

Hanson admitted sending away a fur cape stolen from G. W. Holcomb, and only a coral necklace was recovered yesterday. The child's bank, already mentioned, and a revolver, were identified as stolen from the Wolff home. The only Hanson wearing was from the Rushlight home and some silverware may be identified as coming from there.

Immun Property Not Retrieved.

A large haul was made at the Imman home, and there has been recovered, so far, only some clothing, jewelry and handkerchiefs. A few trinkets only were recovered from the loot of the Livingston home, where four dozen pieces of silverware and a diamond stickpin in a Tiffany setting were among the articles stolen.

Silverware and clothing belonging to Mrs. Merton, a clock owned by Miss Wilson, a revolver and jewelry from the Welet home, six spoons from D. Bradshaw's, and a violin, mandolin, handgrip, revolver and watch stolen from the Kelly residence were recovered.

Hanson says he is an anarchist. Among his effects were found clippings from Portland papers of the Emma Goldman and Dr. Keltman trial. An earmark of Hanson's work, in addition to the early hour, was that he usually cut the telephone wires in the house he was robbing.

RANCHER IS SLAIN

R. B. Neff Found Dead in Field
Near Lakeport.

SUSPECT IS SURROUNDED

A. J. Wittmann, School Director,
Disappears After Shooting at Law-
yer, and Posse Hunting Him on
Murder Charge Is Nearby.

MARSHFIELD, Or., Aug. 15.—(Special.)—R. B. Neff, a resident of the Lakeport district, four miles west of Langlois, Curry County, was shot and killed by an assassin, who used a rifle, some time yesterday afternoon. A. J. Wittmann, a school director, was seen at Black Rock point, carrying a rifle. Wittmann disappeared, however, and a posse of men started toward the point, seven or eight miles south of Lakeport.

Mr. Neff, a prosperous rancher, a bachelor of 55, was working yesterday afternoon at 1 o'clock, and when he did not return at 6 o'clock last night a search was begun, which continued until 11 o'clock last night, when, in the field in which he had been working, the body was found with a bullet hole through the head.

Wittmann was last seen in Lakeport last evening at 5 o'clock, when he encountered Attorney Walker, with whom he had long been on bad terms, owing to a controversy over school affairs.

Both Mr. Walker and Mr. Wittmann being Directors on the School Board, Mr. Neff is said to have taken sides with Mr. Walker in the controversy and thereby to have incurred Wittmann's displeasure.

Mr. Walker and Mr. Wittmann quarreled at the meeting last evening and Mr. Walker said that Wittmann drew a revolver and fired at him, missing. He then took away the revolver from Wittmann, he said, and went to Langlois to get a warrant on Wittmann's arrest. Wittmann disappeared, however, and next came the report of the killing of Mr. Neff.

Sheriff Charles Bailey, of Gold Beach, and a posse of between 25 and 30 deputies, started on a hunt for Wittmann today. At 4 o'clock this afternoon word was received that Wittmann had been seen at Black Rock point, carrying a rifle. At 5 o'clock word was received that the posse had surrounded Wittmann, who, however, was in cover.

Lakeport is a community started several years ago by real estate dealers from Spokane, who built a sawmill and induced many settlers to locate. At one time there was an active community there, but in recent years the town has been simply a little farming center.

Clover Seed Yield Large.

LEBANON, Or., Aug. 15.—(Special.)—Forty acres of alfalfa clover grown on the Robert Langmack farm, near Lebanon, yielded 25 sacks of seed. On the John Meist farm, north of Lebanon, a banner crop of vetch is reported. Twenty-two acres yielded 297 sacks, averaging about 130 pounds each.

ARMY LAYS WASTE ON BALTIC SHORES

Bombardment of German
Warships Burns Villages
and Destroys Villas.

DISTRESS IS WIDESPREAD

Banditti Commit Depredations Un-
molested Because of Collapse of
Civil Authority—Flour
Supply Is Seized.

LONDON, Aug. 15.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press.)—The desolation along the northern Baltic from Memmel to Libau and as far north as the Gulf of Riga, overrun by the German forces from the land side and bombarded by the German fleet from the sea side, are vividly described in Warsaw papers received here. They say that a trip from Memmel to Libau shows the terrible distress left in the wake of the advancing army. Entire villages of several hundred houses, like Kunginski, are totally burned, having suffered most from the fire of the ships.

One of the most noted seashore resorts, Poligna, was bombarded and 40 of its principal summer villas destroyed. The palace of Count Felix Tyskiewicz, whose family has intermarried in America, escaped destruction, but the chapel of the palace was partly destroyed. The hotels and casino and most of the villas stretching along the sea front were burned and portions of the hotel remaining were later used as barracks for General von Heulow's cavalry forces.

German Establish Bread Monopoly.

At Libau a monopoly of the bread supply was established under German military direction, all flour being taken by them except two kilns allowed to each inhabitant. Among the many arrested were two orthodox Russian pastors who were accused of praying to be saved from the invaders, but were released on the plea that their prayers were against invaders of all nationalities.

The fortifications of Libau, particularly on the sea front, were strengthened by large forces of men.

Outside of Lubin the surrounding country is devastated and abandoned. This is especially true of the districts of Kalarvia and Marjampier, the grain fields, usually richly productive, being unsown and in places blackened from fire. The districts of Suwalki and Kowno have similarly suffered. Many incidents are given of banditti who have made their appearance in the country districts, owing to the distress and complete prostration of the civil organization, and commit widespread depredations.

Anti-Jewish Feeling Denied.

The Warsaw Courier prints a statement from Petrograd giving official notice to attacks on the general committee of Warsaw, charging that it discriminates against Jews, not giving them a fair share of the emergency food supplies from the committee warehouses, and limiting the distributions to the afternoons. The reply says that the committee keeps the warehouses open from 8 A. M. until 6 P. M. and makes no distinction of nationality or religion. The only restriction is against applicants who seek to get supplies for the purposes of speculation, and the reply says there are unfortunately many Jews in this class.

The warehouses, it is explained, are meant only to meet the needs of the poor people. As evidence of their impartiality it is cited that from May 21 to June 4, out of a total of 97,877 people thus assisted, 66,686 were Jews.

SEATTLE, Wash., Aug. 15.—(Special.)—Notice! Gentlemen wishing to appear upon the dancing floor must wear collar and tie.

"Sport shirts are barred."

Manager Casper has posted this notice in the entrance to the Hippodrome Dancing Pavilion. He said today: "I don't want to be misunderstood as criticizing the sport shirt as such. It is a cool, comfortable, sensible garment for hot weather, but it is a sport shirt, not a dancing shirt. The time to wear a sport shirt is while boating, or picnicking, or pursuing other amusements out of doors."

"An garment to wear at a dance, it will not do. I consider that a man fails to show a woman proper respect when he wears a sport shirt to a dance at which he is her escort."

"It is right for a man to appear at a dance with a sport shirt, but it is right for a woman to wear a kimono."

More Signs Placed on Highway.

WHITE SALMON, Wash., Aug. 15.—(Special.)—Columbia River Highway signs have been placed from here to Lyle and the Goldendale country, under the direction of Samuel Hill. These, with the several hundred signs placed this Spring by G. P. Hutchins, a local garage man, give directions to motorists.

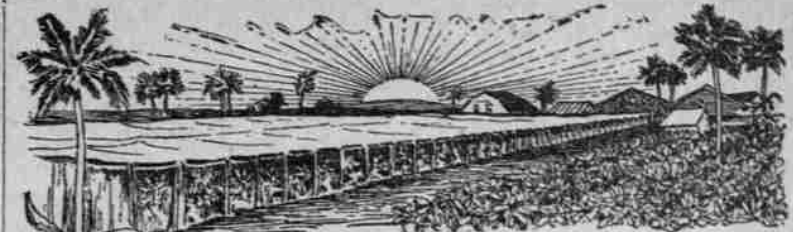

PARIS HONORS KING

Jeweled Sword Is Prepared for
Albert of Belgium.

EXECUTION IS SYMBOLIC

"No Thoroughfare" Inscribed on
Hilt of Weapon That Will Be
Presented Unsheathed in To-
ken of Country's Need.

PARIS, July 17.—(Correspondence of the Associated Press.)—The sword of honor to be presented by the people of Paris to King Albert has been completed by the sculptor Fetu. It will first be submitted to General Florentin, grand chancellor of the Legion of Honor, then to Monsieur Poincare, President of the Republic, after which it will be placed on view for a time at the exhibition of Belgian art.

"No thoroughfare" is the inscription on the guard at the foot of the hilt in the form of a statuette in massive gold, representing a young athlete on the defensive, brandishing a club. The statuette represents the Flemish type, a Belgian having posed for the figure.

The guard is also of massive gold, bearing the arms of the City of Paris in blue and red enamel, with the cross of the legion of honor and the device: "Fiducia nec pergitur." On the other side of the guard, in golden letters on

blue enamel, is the inscription, "The people of Paris to His Majesty Albert I, King of the Belgians."

Inscriptions Set With Gems.

The date is set in diamonds. The inscription on this side is surmounted by a laurel wreath set with emeralds and rubies.

The blade of the sword is in steel of Saint-Etienne, ornamented with panoplies of steel on gold, with these lines by Jean Richepin:

"Droite, sans tache, sans effort,
J'ai pour ame ton ame, O Roi."
("Straight, spotless and fearless,
I have for my soul thy soul, O King.")

The sheath is of fish skin, tanned by a process revived from the 18th century. The chape bears the arms of the 13 Belgian provinces, on a field of flowers and vegetation of the country, flax, hops and colza. It is surmounted by a mural crown.

The belt is a rich piece of embroidery, designed by Madame Van Dierckx, in eight different golden tints, with ivy, symbolizing attachment; wheat, signifying abundance; oak, indicating force, and the laurel of glory, interlaced upon velvet in the colors of Paris.

Sword to Be Presented Unsheathed.

The golden belt buckle is composed of three civic crowns, one of them forming the frame for the figure of a charging cavalier—emblem of war—another the Gallic cock, and the third the Belgian lion. The sword is encased in a white satin case with the crowned monogram of King Albert.
