GERRICK IS TAKEN OUT

Despite five errors and some lack-lustre playing, Portland defeated the University of Chicago ball tossers yesterday 7-2 before a crowd of not over 100 fans. Gus Fisher dropped two throws at the home plate and let in both Chicago tallies or it would have been a shutout. Gus' errors likewise forced Walter McCredie to beach his young pitcher, Gerrick, after four innings in the box, because he didn't want to take any chances of losing to a bunch of amateurs.

Gerrick showed some good hooks during his brief sojourn in the box, but that was about all. His control was not big-edged, due no doubt to nervousness, but his chief fault seemed to be his inertia around the mound. Paul Dea Jardin, all-American center and football hero, did not go to the mound for the visitors. Pat Gates, southpaw, manager-coach of the squad, went to the knoll instead. His tactics did not prove much of a mystery to the Beavers' manager, R. H. E. Bates. He left left field for Sacramento and goes from there to San Francisco to sail the 25th of the month for the Orient. The team will not be back in Chicago according to the present schedule, until just before Christmas. It has played 11 games to date and lost two.

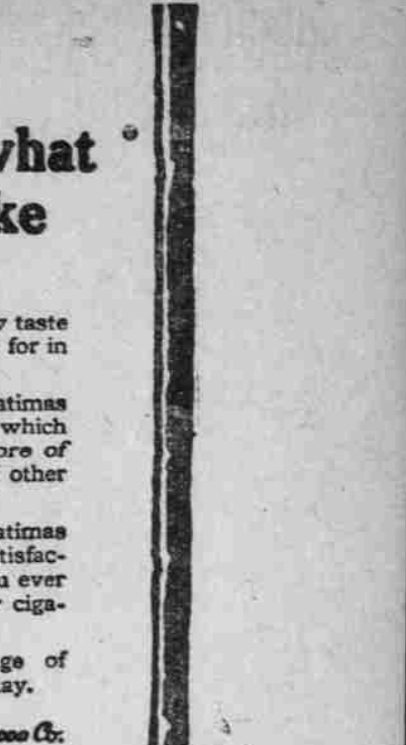
