It was evident that Mr. Kelly announcement of withdrawal last Saturday was considered seriously by some of those who sought Mr. Starr's recall, even though Mr. Kelly's name was left on the ballot.

The result is considered to have been brought about largely by the active campaign made in Mr. Starr's behalf since the recall petition was filed. His friends railled and went to the polls to record their protest against what they
