"DOLLAR DAY" PLANNED

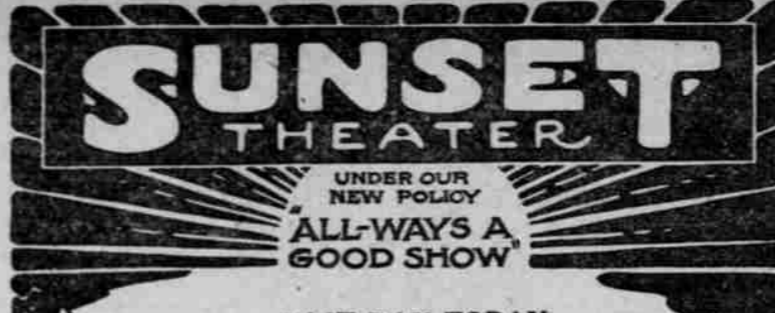
CHAMBER OF COMMERCE ARRANGING RETAIL TRADE STIMULUS.

Committee Will Be Appointed at Luncheon Thursday to Provide for All Details.

"Dollar day" is the next big event carded by the Portland Chamber of Commerce as a business reviver for the retail merchant. It is intended to make this event fully equal in importance to Buyers' week for the wholesaler and manufacturer, who are only in the preparatory stage for Dollar day, but a committee from the retail merchants' bureau of the Chamber has investigated successful events of a similar character held in other cities and has decided to present a tentative programme. The report will be made at a meeting of the bureau to be held Thursday noon at the Chamber of Commerce. The committee to entertain all retailers at a luncheon have been completed, and during its progress there will be a discussion of Dollar day. Committees will be appointed and the machinery for making the event one of tremendous significance to retailers and their customers will be set in motion.

"Our information is that the merchant who participates in these selling events attracts people who were not familiar with his stock, and in many instances it was found that patrons discovered lines of goods that they did not know existed in their own cities," said Charles F. Berg, chairman of the general committee in charge.

In connection with Dollar day an effort will be made to have a store windows display Oregon products.
