

WASHBURN FALLS BEFORE JOHNSTON

Former Oregon Tennis Champion Wins Match in Three Straight Sets.

WESTERNERS ARE VICTORS

In Doubles Griffin and Johnston Put Up Wonderful Game, Out-smashing and Outvolleying Leroy and Bull With Ease.

NEWPORT, R. I., Aug. 18.—Playing his top game, William Johnston, Pacific Coast star and former Oregon tennis champion, today defeated W. M. Washburn off his best, winning in three straight sets. Not once during the contest was there the least doubt as to the better man. The Westerner's game was far superior to anything he has shown yet this season.

The late afternoon play was devoted to the doubles, the opponents of the Pacific Coast champions, Clarence J. Griffin and Johnston, and of R. Norris Williams II and Watson M. Washburn, the Eastern champions, again furnishing the feature.

The playing of the young Californians, who stand as challengers to McLaughlin and Bundy for National honors, was far above the ordinary. They out-smashed and out-volleyed Robert Leroy and Charles M. Bull, Jr., the New York pair, and won, 6-2, 7-5.

Williams again was somewhat erratic on his shorter playing at the net, so that Washburn had to effect many of the errors of his former partner, but it was nevertheless fast tennis that the two played against D. S. Walters, the New Orleans boy, and Harold J. Mackinnon, of Providence.

CHICAGO, Aug. 18.—Shooting under the conditions which will prevail under the American handicap tomorrow, 633 devotees of trapshooting congregated here today in the preliminary handicap of the Interstate Association's annual meet.

H. H. Morse, Chicago, shooting from 15 yards, won with a count of 95 hits out of the 100 single targets. He was awarded a trophy and \$336.

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SLATON DENOUNCES MAYOR OF ATLANTA

Ex-Governor of Georgia Says Frank Case Has Been Made "Football of Politics."

MOB SPIRIT CONDEMNED

City Official's Warning Not to Return to State Declared Absurd and Ridiculous and Reflection on Commonwealth.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 18.—Ex-Governor Slaton, of Georgia, issued today a statement on the Frank case condemning and address delivered last night by Mayor Woodward, of Atlanta, Ga., in defense of the lynching, and terming the Mayor "old and garrulous." He called the Frank case a "football of politics."

Commenting on Mr. Woodward's statement that three-fourths of the people of Georgia, including himself, believed Frank guilty, Mr. Slaton said: "Similar utterances made before the lynching naturally resulted in subsequent proposals to defend the fair name of Atlanta and Georgia, and in the next breath he cast on them the most terrible odium and condemnation."

"Case 'Football of Politics.'" "Mayor Woodward suggested I could not with safety return to Georgia within a year. Such a statement is not only a gross reflection on the state, but is absurd and ridiculous, and it is further stimulative of the mob impulse, coming from an official who should stand in favor of law and order. It is in accordance with utterances of others who expect to utilize the Frank case for political preferment and as an asset for dominating the politics of Georgia. It is horrible to think that a human life could be made a football of politics."

"I was born in Georgia and I love her and her reputation. I shall return there in accordance with my original intentions. The inflammatory utterances of Mayor Woodward and of others who may lead them for political purposes, will not deter me in the slightest."

Mayor's Statement Cabled Abroad. "I condemn the action of the mob. A refusal to maintain the duly organized institution of the state means anarchy and that is what I declared yesterday that, in my judgment, the great conscience of Georgia will condemn any lawless action."

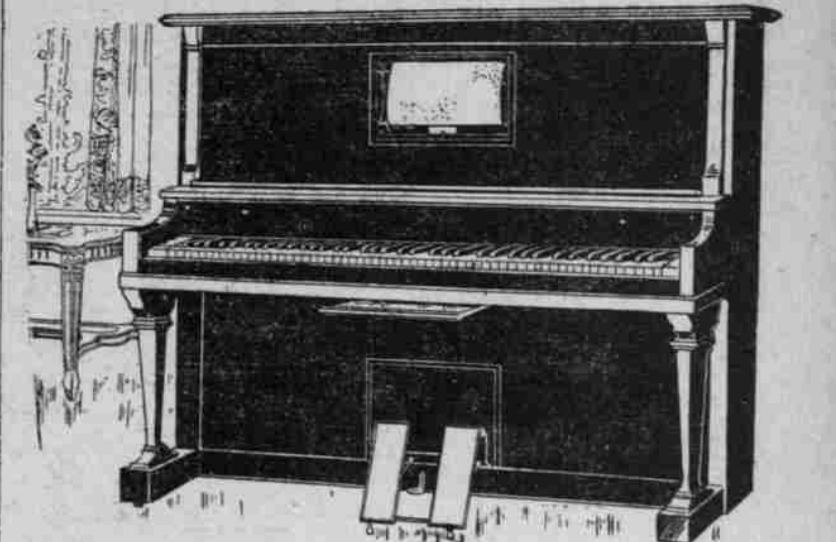
STATE WILL OFFER REWARD Georgia Governor Promises Thorough Probe of Frank Affair. ATLANTA, Ga., Aug. 18.—Plans for the investigation of the lynching of Leo M. Frank went forward steadily today. Governor Harris said a thorough inquiry would be made and that rewards would be offered for the arrest and conviction of the men who took Frank from the state prison at Milledgeville and hanged him near Marietta. In a statement tonight the Governor said:

The lynching will be probed to the bottom, and every effort within my power will be made to bring the guilty members of the mob to justice. At the same time I will offer rewards for the arrest and conviction of the men."

Governor Harris will have a conference with three members of the Prison Commission tomorrow. Each of the commissioners was in Warden Smith's home the night Frank was taken away.

RACE FEELING IS DENIED

GEORGIAN SAYS SOUTHERNERS RESPECT JEWISH PEOPLE. Lynching of Frank Denounced as Murder and Hope Expressed Perpetrators Will Be Punished.

"I hope the people of the North will not judge the State of Georgia by the action of the mob that murdered Leo Frank," said Representative Charles G. Edwards, of Savannah, Ga., who was in Portland yesterday as a member of the rivers and harbors committee.

"Murder is the right word to apply to the men who lynched Frank," continued Mr. Edwards, "and it was the foulest kind of murder. A greater crime than that never disgraced the name of Georgia or of any other state."

Mr. Edwards expressed confidence that the authorities of this state will bring the perpetrators of the crime to justice. "Every man who had a hand in it," he said, "ought to be hunted down and tried on a charge of murder. Those who are found guilty merit the extreme penalty."
