

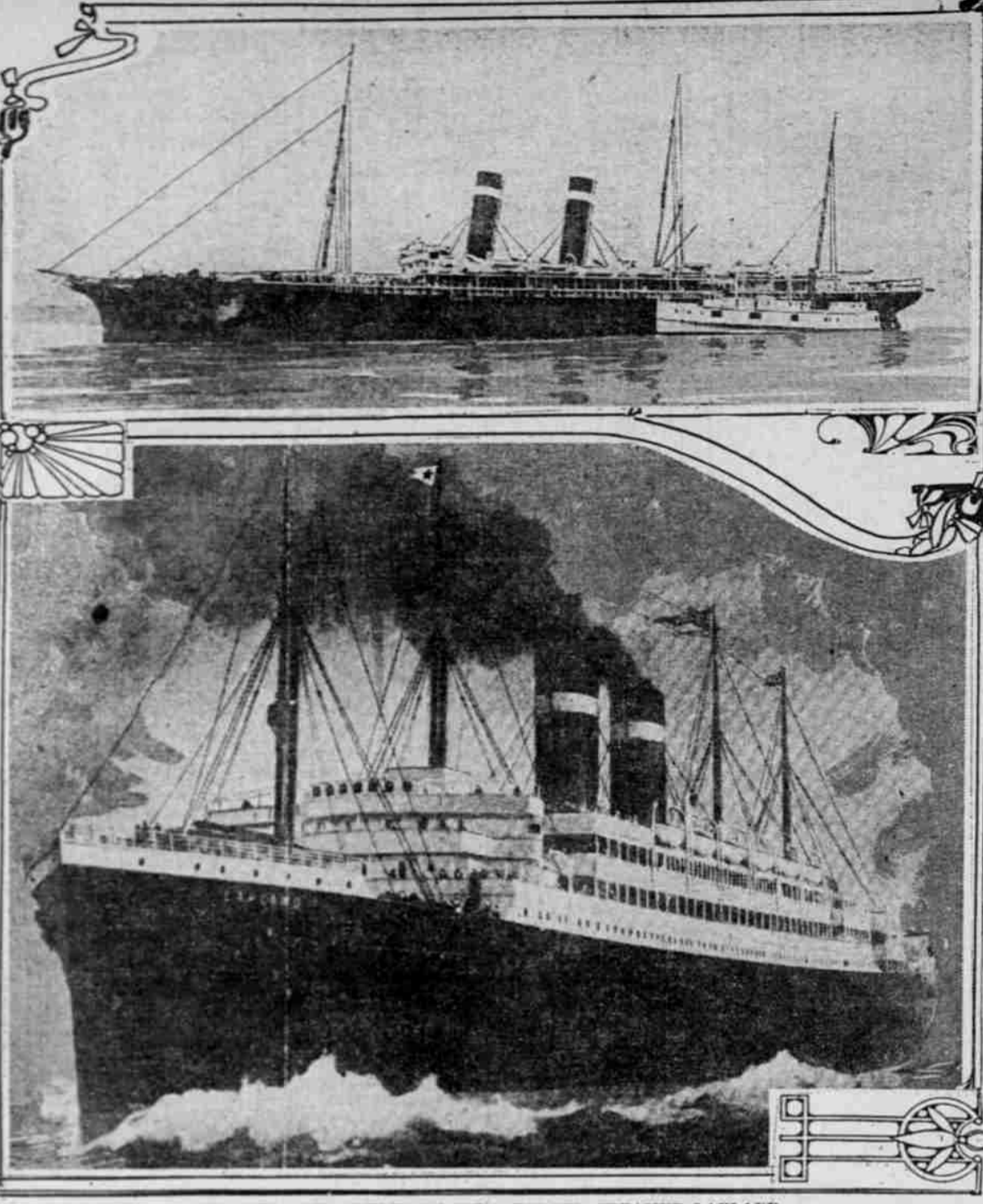
TWO AMERICANS ON LIST OF LOST

3 IN DEATH-THREAT NET

TWO WOMEN AND MAN ACCUSED OF ASSAULT IN ELKTON.

Gun Reported to Have Been Drawn on Druggist for Statements Alleged to Be Slandereous.

ROSEBURG, Or., Aug. 20.—(Special.)—Accused of threatening to kill L. L. Shad, an Elkton druggist, Miss Dottie Levine and Lillian Maltreps and the former's father, James Levine, today were held by the Elkton magistrate to appear before the grand jury during the next term of the Circuit Court.

The alleged assault occurred in the drugstore conducted by Mr. Shad Sunday night. It is said that Miss Maltreps entered the store and accused Mr. Shad of making slanderous accusations.

Her arm was grasped by a bystander, and Miss Levine is alleged to have grabbed the gun and threatened to shoot Mr. Shad.

In the melee that followed Mr. Shad's clothes were torn and he was painfully injured.

According to reports from Elkton, Mr. Shad and Miss Maltreps were acquainted during their residence in Portland, and had been keeping company since coming to Elkton.

Angelo Natta, proprietor of the Rose City Bakery, 148 Grand avenue, who was seriously injured in a motorcycle accident Thursday night, did not regain consciousness at St. Vincent's Hospital until late yesterday.

His condition is critical. He has a fractured skull. E. S. Peterson, 1321 Denver street, and E. F. Guldner, 789 Belmont, who were hurt in a Hiney accident on Alhena avenue Thursday night, were both reported as doing well yesterday.

Mr. Peterson is at the Good Samaritan and Mr. Guldner at St. Vincent's Hospital.

DEFIANCE IS NOTED

American Editors Say Diplomacy Has Come to Naught.

NEXT MOVE UP TO WILSON

Question to Be Determined Now Is Whether Arabic Was Torpedoed Without Warning—Grave Crisis Believed Near.

Comment of the press of the United States on the sinking of the Arabic agrees in the main that the act was a defiance of the American position, that all the diplomatic correspondence between the two countries has come to naught and that the American people will support the President in such appropriate action as he decides to take.

Act Intentionally Unfriendly. Sacramento Bee—If it be established that Americans were drowned by a German submarine torpedoing the Arabic without warning, then Germany is openly and deliberately flaunting our declaration that such action would be construed as intentionally unfriendly.

Chicago Journal—The sinking of the Arabic is exactly the same sort of piracy as the sinking of the Lusitania, with the added aggravation of being done in the face of the American Government should break off diplomatic relations with Germany over this occurrence.

Seattle Times—Until we know more of the circumstances surrounding the sinking of the White Star liner Arabic, we must not feel too free to express our opinions. If the Arabic was torpedoed without warning, there will be plenty of time in which to express our disgust for such methods of warfare.

Seattle (Wash.) Post-Intelligencer—In the shattering Arabic, at the bottom of Berlin has an acute regard for ethical phases of war as has Villa or Carranza, and is equally deaf to rhetorical warnings from Washington.

Butte (Mont.) Daily Post—If the facts are as they now appear to be, the conclusion must be that Germany does not intend to depart from the tactics which resulted in the sinking of the Lusitania. Apparently the recent diplomatic correspondence between Washington and Berlin carries no practical results.

WOMAN IS DROWNED

Son Says Mrs. Bruguiere Disappeared in Ocean.

YOUNG MAN IS RESCUED

Boats Had Left Vessel's Side When Two Americans Reached Promenade Deck—Victim Prominent Socially East and West.

QUEENSTOWN, Aug. 20.—A statement made here today by Louis Bruguiere, a passenger on the Arabic, indicated there is no doubt that his mother, Mrs. Josephine L. Bruguiere, an American, was drowned. Mr. Bruguiere said his mother disappeared after being in the water for about 20 minutes.

Mr. Bruguiere said he and his mother were the last to leave the promenade deck. They reached the deck after the last boat had left the ship. This boat was too far away to be reached by his mother.

When he came again to the surface Mrs. Bruguiere had disappeared. Half an hour later the son was dragged aboard one of the ship's small boats. In this boat he found his two bulldogs, which he had thrown overboard.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 20.—Mrs. Josephine S. Bruguiere was the widow of the late California millionaire banker, Emile Bruguiere, and mother of Dr. Peder S. Bruguiere, of this city. Mr. Bruguiere, it is believed, was returning from Paris to New York, accompanied by her youngest son, Louis Bruguiere.

Mrs. Bruguiere, who was 65 years old, had for several years maintained a residence in Paris in addition to her villa Castlewood at Newport, R. I. She was prominent socially on both sides of the Atlantic. Formerly she lived in San Francisco and Monterey.

GOVERNOR BACK FROM FAIR

Benson Day Is Success and Oregon Organization Is Praised.

SALEM, Or., Aug. 20.—(Special.)—Governor Withycombe returned today after attending the "Benson day" exercises at the San Francisco Exposition.

"I am wonderfully satisfied with the Oregon building," said the Governor. "It seems to me that it is making the biggest kind of a hit. In it is a most excellent representation of our farms, gardens, orchards, forests and schools. I believe Oregon is reaping more benefit from the Exposition than any other state, excepting California."

HOME LOAN POSSIBLE

PROSPECT AFFECTS SITUATION OF FOREIGN EXCHANGE.

Financiers Representing Allies Admit Complications, but Deny Negotiations Are Off.

NEW YORK, Aug. 20.—Misgivings as to developments in this country's relations with Germany, as the result of the destruction of the Arabic, featured the foreign exchange situation here today.

American bankers might be called on to finance a large domestic loan gave rise to many rumors concerning the negotiations now pending over the flotation of a \$150,000,000 foreign credit loan or some other form of British credit here.

"We can well conceive of such a situation," was the comment of one international banker whose views were sought on this point.

A report that negotiations for the flotation of a British credit loan of from \$100,000,000 to \$150,000,000 to pay for American supplies purchased by foreign buyers had been virtually suspended was denied.

Financial representatives here of the allied powers, while asserting that the situation had become complicated by reason of the Arabic incident, refrained from discussion of the prospect for placing the contemplated foreign loan, as did also domestic financiers.

Aside from the Arabic, the feature of the day in foreign exchange markets was the reported decision of British financiers and Treasury authorities to send a deputation of three men from London to New York to arrange the projected loan.

FIRE FOLLOWS POLICY

Newberg Home Burns Almost on Hour Insurance Renewed.

NEWBERG, Or., Aug. 20.—(Special.)—While the family of V. T. Hinshaw was at dinner yesterday neighbors rushed in with the news that the roof of their house was burning. Almost instantly the entire upper portion of the building was ablaze. The fire department saved a barn and garage near by and much of the furniture. The building, valued at \$2000, is a total loss. It was insured for only \$700, and \$500 was carried on the furniture.

The insurance policy on the property expired at noon of that day, but had been renewed to take effect at that hour.
