Chancellor Tells Reichstag Plan Is to Use Germany as Tool After War.

FOES BITTERLY ARRIGNED

BERLIN, by wireless to Sayville, N. Y., Aug. 21.—Dr. von Bethmann-Hollweg, the German Imperial Chancellor, in a speech today at the opening of the Reichstag, after a recess since May 29, in a sensational address, quoted the words which he declared Sir Edward Grey spoke to the German ambassador at London when the latter took leave of the British Foreign Minister after the beginning of the war in August, 1914.

170 BIG STEAMERS SUNK BY U BOATS

Nearly 2000 Non-Combatants Dead as Result of German Method of Warfare.

AMERICANS ARE IGNORED

WILSON TO INVESTIGATE

CHARGES OF ACTIVITY BY GERMAN AGENTS CONSIDERED.

Subject to Be Discussed With Lansing Because of Mention of Names of Members of Embassy.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 20.—President Wilson took up officially Thursday afternoon the question of American rights in the United States.

The President discussed the question with Attorney-General Gregory, asking what steps had already been taken and whether anything had been discovered calling for action by the Federal Government.

The Attorney-General said he had not read carefully the charges published in the New York World that German agents, with the approval of the German government, had fomented strikes in munitions factories and engaged in other such actions.

Because of his mention of the names of the German Embassy in published reports, President Wilson probably will discuss the situation with Secretary Lansing in the near future.
