Manhattan Borough President Passes Busy Day; Municipal Administration Discussed.

WIFE SPEAKS ON SUFFRAGE

New York Man Favors Franchise for Women and Says Spirit of Militarism Must Not Be Developed.

Marcus M. Marks, business man. That is the title that rightfully belongs to the man who serves as official head of 2,500,000 persons on Manhattan Island and holds a position of Commissioner of Public Works in the City of New York.

In the morning as the great Commissioner H. G. Black, Mr. Marks learned of the details of municipal government of the City of Portland. At luncheon at the Chamber of Commerce he talked of the businesslike methods that he had injected into the administration of the public affairs of the Borough of Manhattan.

Mr. Marks Installed Markets. Mr. Marks is known as the President of the Borough of Manhattan. He believes in "running a borough on a business line."

At the Portland Hotel the members of the Congressional Union who had gathered to hear Mr. Marks heard from him and Mrs. Marks the details of the fight that they are waging for equal suffrage.

Business System Followed. Mr. Marks has arranged the administrative scheme of the Borough of Manhattan as though he were running a big department store.

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Militarism is Opposed. "We are listening to the appeal of some of our public men for National preparedness. We must not do the barbaric things that are being done in Europe. We must not develop a spirit of militarism, but we must develop an international cooperation of the states."

GREAT SCHOOL DESIRED

UNIVERSITY PROPOSED AS MEANS FOR WORLD PEACE.

Thousands Professors, Teaching Pupils From Every Country, Declared Mighty Influence for Good.

OAKLAND, Cal., Aug. 24.—A university at Washington, D. C., with 1000 professors and an income of \$10,000,000 a year, to teach students of all nations, was suggested today as a school for world peace.

NO WARNING GIVEN

White Star Issues Statement on Sinking of Arabic.

TORPEDO SEEN BY CAPTAIN

No Effort Made to Ram Submarine, Which Was Not Seen by Those on Board Liner, Which Was Undisguised and Unarmed.

LONDON, Aug. 24.—The managers of the White Star Line at Liverpool gave out to the newspapers today the following statement:

"At the time of the Lusitania torpedoing many misleading and untrue statements appeared regarding the incident. Similar statements are beginning to be hinted at in the case of the Arabic, which are equally untrue. There is no question of the Arabic having tried to escape, except the proper caution of having put the helm hard over when they saw the torpedo."

"There is no doubt the Arabic was struck with a torpedo. Captain Finch did not see the submarine, but undoubtedly saw the torpedo."

No Effort Made to Ram the Boat. "There is no question of the Arabic's having tried to ram the submarine, because it was not seen from the bridge."

The Arabic was undoubtedly sunk without warning. She was in peaceful trading, with various nationalities aboard. She was outward bound, so there is no question of munitions, and was not disguised in any way, nor had she any guns mounted.

Proper Precautions Taken. "With respect to precautions taken, these were thorough and proper, having regard to all that has taken place in the danger zone. The captain had life-jackets on hand for everybody. Rafts were unlash and deck lifeboats opened up and both rafts and deck lifeboats played an important part in life-saving as well as the regular lifeboats."

The American Embassy has transmitted by cable to Washington the gist of seven depositions taken by Consul Washington at Liverpool, six of which were from witnesses on board the Arabic and the seventh from Captain Finch, of that steamer.

JOHN M. NEWELL HELD TO GRAND JURY ON EMBEZZLEMENT PLAIN.

Mrs. Blaudia Kenny Says Property Worth \$1000 Taken After He Promises to Wed Her.

Accused of appropriating property of an elderly widow to the value of about \$1000, the strength of his accepted proposal of marriage, made last December, John M. Newell, formerly connected with the Barre Granite Company, was held in answer to the grand jury by Municipal Judge Stevenson yesterday under bail of \$1000.

The state alleges Newell courted Mrs. Blaudia Kenny, 415 Fifth street, last Fall, and in December proposed. It is then asserted that she gave him a check for \$1000 to deposit to her credit at her bank, instead of which he placed it in his own credit. A \$200 gold watch was next appropriated, it is charged, together with two small diamonds valued at \$100. It is said that Newell secured a deed to four lots in trust, on which he took out mortgages to his advantage. A second charge which will be investigated by the grand jury is that

FORT STEVENS MEN ILL

GARRISON IN CAMP IS AFFLICTED WITH STRANGE MALADY.

Examination of Food Fails to Disclose Cause—Previous Poisoning Case Recalled.

PORT STEVENS, Or., Aug. 24.—(Special.)—Practically the entire garrison camped at Fort Stevens for the purpose of training during the "war period" preceding target practice are seriously ill from some unknown cause.

A careful investigation conducted by Captain Waldron reveals the surprising fact that some of the men who were suffering had not eaten at the camp site cooking utensils and water receptacles fails to bring to light the source of the mysterious ailment.
