NEW HOOD AND LADDER TRUCK ACCIDENT—Portland now has another automobile hood and ladder truck almost equal in size to the big white truck used for several months past at the headquarters station on Fourth, near Morrison street. The City Council yesterday formally accepted the new truck delivered by the Commercial Fire Apparatus Company and will put it into service probably today at the station at East Third and East Pine streets. The truck was ordered last November. Two other trucks had been made to fill this order, but both were wrecked before delivery.

Mrs. COVENS DELEGATED TO SPEAK—E. P. Coffin, Commission, has been delegated to speak on the subject of "Public Safety," before the committee on the subject in San Francisco October 7. His selection has been made by President Kingsley, of the Safety First Federation, before the committee was asked to designate some one to make the address. Few men in the United States have been more active in "safety first" work than Mr. Coffin. After the address in San Francisco he will go to Detroit to attend the first annual convention of the Safety First Federation.

REALLY HEAVY MEANS SEPTEMBER 2—The first meeting of the Really Heavy Board since the beginning of the vacation season will be held Friday, September 2, at the Chamber of Commerce. A business meeting will be held, but the principal feature of the programme will be the series of reports from those who attended the National convention of really men, of D. Vincent, J. D. Lee, F. E. Taylor and Paul A. Cawwell will be the representatives from the Northwest. About 100 men were present at the National convention.

NEW DAIRY BARN LAW PROPOSED—In place of an ordinance to prohibit dairy barns for more than two cows within a large part of the residence section of Portland, the city's legal bureau has prepared a measure prohibiting such barns in cases where property owners live within 100 feet of such barns. This measure has been turned over to the Commissioner Kingsley who will present it to the Council. The original measure prohibited the dairy barns under any conditions. This was considered too severe.

FRANK LEIMON STILL IN JAIL—Efforts of Frank Leimon, former sales manager of the United States Cigar Company, to secure \$5000 bond for his release from detention by the Federal Government failed yesterday, the securities offered by him being rejected by the Federal authorities. Leimon will remain in custody until the bonds have been arranged satisfactorily. He is endeavoring to arrange for this again and will try to present satisfactory securities before the end of the week.

YOUTH FINED FOR SPEEDING—Admitting that he was going at least 20 miles an hour down Washington street when the speed limit is 15 miles, Carl Swigert, son of Charles F. Swigert, president of the Pacific Bridge Company, was fined \$25 for speeding yesterday. The boy had spent a night in jail, and the police were censured for this by Judge Stevenson before he was released.

LEWIS INSPECTIONS TO GATHER—This morning at 10 o'clock in the Lewis building the regular monthly meeting of the inspection bureau of the lumbermen of the Northwest will be held. E. C. Ames, of Seattle, chairman of the board, will have charge of the meeting. The inspection bureau of the lumbermen is composed of the manufacturers of the Northwest states.

SURAK TRIP SENTENCED—James Patrick, arrested Tuesday by Detective Cabill and Tichener on suspicion of having rifled a woman's trunk in the lodging-house where he was staying, was sentenced to 30 days by Municipal Judge Stevenson yesterday.

REDEMPTION BANK PRESIDENT HERE—Guy Dobson, ex-building inspector of Portland, now president of the Redmond Bank of Commerce of Redmond, Or., was a visitor in the city yesterday. Mr. Dobson was building inspector up to about six years ago.

LUIGI FRANCIS WILLARD DIES SUDDENLY—Luigi Francis Willard, aged 75, died yesterday morning suddenly at the home of his son George E. Willard, 351 Schuyler street. He ate his breakfast and passed away shortly afterward. A physician was called who pronounced old age the cause of his death. Mr. Willard was born in Milton, Mass., and moved to Mount Pleasant, Ia., where he resided for 44 years. Six years ago he moved to Portland. Mr. Willard enjoyed the distinction of being the oldest Mason in Oregon, having been a member of that order for 50 years. He retained his membership in the high lodge, the commander-in-chief and charter at Mount Pleasant, Ia., his former home. Arrangements for the funeral are being made.

DELAY IN IMPROVEMENT WORKS—Extension of East Thirteenth street from Maiden avenue, in Sellwood, to the Portland Crematorium is wanted. Petitions were filed for this extension last February and there has been no remonstrance. Several committees have endeavored to have the extension hurried forward, but the improvement has not been made. The Sellwood Board of Trade will take up this matter with the Council again. The Sellwood branch of the Portland Railway, Light & Power Company occupies a right of way in East Thirteenth street, but it is said this will not prevent the street being opened as petitioned for.

LECTURES AT FAIR WILL BE GIVEN—J. D. Mickle, State Dairy and Food commissioner, has completed plans for the special dairy trade at the county fair at Gresham that will be of interest to dairymen. The first daily lecture will be given by Professor B. R. Gates, of the Oregon Agricultural College. The other speakers will be J. M. Dickson, of Rhedds; W. K. Newell, of Gaston; W. W. Schmeichel, of Hillsboro, and E. A. Westcott, of Banks. Premiums offered for the best dairy tests have been withdrawn to make room for the educational tests. In this division there will be no prizes, and the prize money will be used to defray the expenses of these demonstrations.

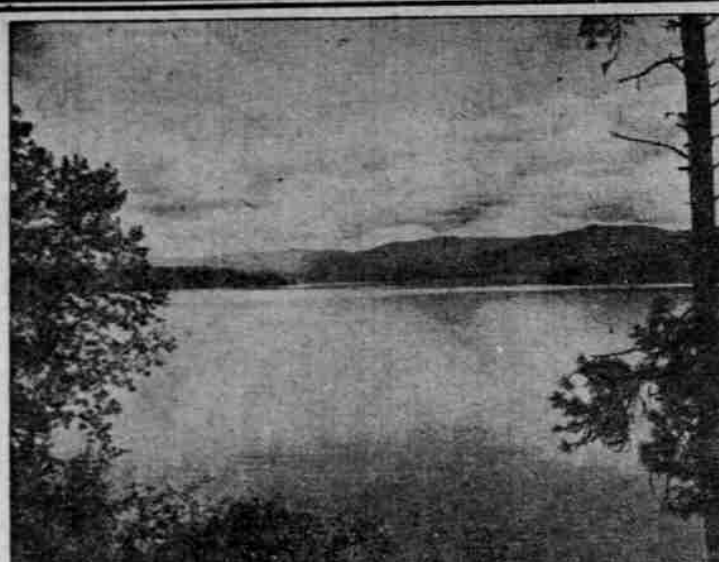

GARBAGE LAW IS DESIRED Mr. Daly Asks That Collection Be Restricted to Night Hours. Garbage hauling restrictions existing now as orders by the incinerator superintendent, will be put in ordinance form if a measure presented to the Council yesterday by Commissioner Daly is adopted. M. and in covered wagons; and would prohibit the hauling of garbage at other places within the district bounded by Oak, First, Yamhill and Tenth streets, except between 10 P. M. and 10 A. M.
