Co-operation of the public in the campaign to eradicate the elm-leaf beetle, which is threatening the destruction of elm trees in various parts of the city, is asked by City Commissioner Baker and Park Superintendent Convill. They ask all persons having elm trees to examine them and inform the park bureau at the City Hall if beetles are found.


