CITY BILL REDUCER OFFERED.—A novel loose-leaf booklet system has been brought forward by City Commissioner Dick as a means of cutting down the city's printing bills. The plan which is to be worked out in all municipal publications subject to change involves the printing of separate loose leaves and fastening them together between binders instead of having the matter printed in bound books. By the system a change in the publication can be made by having the single page reprinted and inserted into the loose leaf binder in place of having to have the entire book republished or amended.

DAIRIES HERE INSPECTED.—B. H. Rawl and J. E. Dorman, the former chief of the dairy division and the latter in charge of the western office of the dairy division of the United States bureau of animal industry, were in Portland yesterday. They were taken for a trip to some of the dairies by City Health Officer Marcelino and Dr. D. W. Mack, of the Portland milk inspection bureau. The officials are on a general inspection trip of Utah, New Mexico, Nevada, Arizona, California, Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Montana and Wyoming.

VISITING PROFESSOR ENTERTAINED.—The Portland alumni of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology will entertain Professor Davis R. Dewey at a luncheon at the University Club today. Professor Dewey is professor of economics at the institute, and is a well known authority on the subject. He is editor of the American Review of Economics. Fifteen or 20 alumni, it is expected, will attend the luncheon. Professor Dewey is touring the West.

ALLEGED SWINDLER RETURNED.—Thomas H. Maguire, record clerk in District Attorney Evans' office, returned from Columbus, O., yesterday morning with John H. Marble, the former Portland barber who was the principal witness for the state in the prosecution of E. C. Von Klein for obtaining money by false pretenses three years ago. Marble has been charged to that for which Von Klein was convicted.

MRS. MARKE TAKES FOR SUFFRAGE.—Mrs. Marketa M. Marketa, wife of the president of the Borough of Manhattan, addressed the members of the Congressional Union for Woman Suffrage at luncheon in the dining-room of the Hotel Hamilton yesterday. She urged that every Portland resident who has a voting right in New York write to him and request that he support the suffrage amendment that is to be submitted next November.

FLY HATCHING SHOW.—Fly hatching in actual progress is a feature of a housewife exhibited by the City Health Bureau yesterday in a window at 242 Washington street. A jar well-filled with fly pupa has been put on exhibit. From the wormlike, evil full-fledged flies will hatch out within a few days. In addition to the hatching, the exhibit includes about 1,000 dead flies caught in traps maintained by the Health Bureau.

ALASKA LAKE HEARING GOES ON.—The examination of witnesses in the Alkali Lake hearing before the Surveyor-General of the United States for the district of Oregon has been continued for the past few days and according to E. G. Worth, the Surveyor-General, will continue until next Monday evening. After all the witnesses have been examined the case will be removed to Lakewood.

MAX HELD NOT DEANE.—Ed Switzer, arrested Wednesday as a result of alleged threats against Miss Catherine Helfert, was adjudged not insane by Dr. W. D. T. Williams yesterday. Switzer is being held in the County Jail pending action of the authorities with regard to the alleged threat. Miss Helfert, it is said, had spurned his attentions.

MADAME VALERIE GOING TO SEASIDE.—Madame Valerie Valer, a Portland contractor, will go to Seaside on Saturday to participate in the fair that will be given there for the benefit of a fund to provide a monument for the "rail car" made famous by the Lewis and Clark expedition. Mrs. R. W. Schmeer and several other Portland artists will assist in the benefit programme.

RELATIVES OF E. F. KENNEDY SOUGHT.—J. Foster, business agent of the machinists' union of Montreal, Quebec, telegraphed the Portland police yesterday for information as to relatives of E. F. Kennedy, who died in the Canadian city yesterday. Kennedy was a machinist and is supposed to have relatives in Portland.

LAUNCH TRIP SENTENCED.—Gus Johnson appeared before District Judge Bell yesterday and pleaded guilty to stealing a launch and motor valued at \$25. He was sentenced to six months in the County Jail.

REHEARSAL IS GAY

"Play Festival" at Columbia Park Is Tomorrow.

500 CHILDREN PARTICIPATE

Musical Drills and Dances, With Athletic Games, to Feature Kiddies' Big City Playground Celebration.

Come to see, Oh, ye children, At Columbia Park tomorrow. You'll be having a heap of fun.

MERRY, HEALTHY, ROSE-CHEEKED KIDDIES flocked to that park yesterday for the final rehearsal of the "Play Festival" to be held at Columbia Park tomorrow at 2 o'clock. Imagine over 500 youngsters from the various city playgrounds keeping perfect time with their little hands and feet to the rhythmic accompaniment of the Municipal Band.

Most of the children who appeared yesterday were in bright colored costumes, yellow, light blue, scarlet and white in long swaying files or in tripping, dancing circles made Columbia Park a regular gala scene. Fourteen city playgrounds were represented, and all about sat happy juvenile spectators, who represented almost every class of Portland's childhood. Little ones in faded, worn garments mingled contentedly with the scores of well-groomed kiddies from the best of the city homes. Even the outie little pickaninies, kinky-haired and merry, were in the games.

Drill Follows March. The afternoon opened with a grand march. Immediately afterwards came the "rose drill," which was a pretty spectacle of little dancing figures and flower wreaths. As a part of this dance was the especially vivacious and attractive "Danish dance of greeting" and the "Kinder polka," both of which were participated in by children under 10 years.

The building of the pyramids required both skill and strength, and was made attractive by unique and striking figures, and a long line of youths in white shirts and dark

knickerbockers. Today the presentation of trophies will be made by James O. Conville. Immediately after the pyramid drill. All those who have made 50 points during the season and passed the rigid badge test are to receive their insignia today.

The "Rain Bow Drill" which follows is another meritorious number. The "Venetian Gondolier Dance" is a striking dance which the little maidens have mastered particularly well. "Teasing," J. Lee Thompson's composition, is a dance which is especially popular with the youngsters, because of its rhythm and catchy swing. This will also be danced.

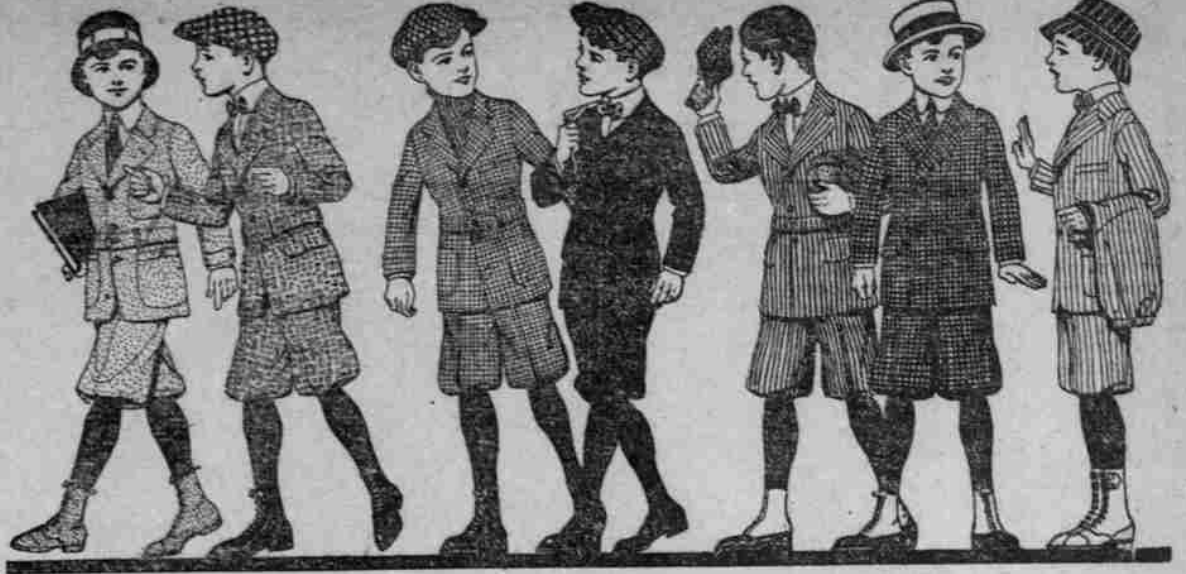

DR. JOHN EDWARDS DIES

Native of Minnesota Once Elected Head of Medical Association.

Dr. John Milton Edwards, a native of Minnesota, but for the last three years a practicing physician of this city with offices in the Elgers building, died yesterday. Death came after a lingering illness of several months. Dr. Edwards was one of the best-known physicians in the city, and although he had been here but three years he had built up an extensive practice. He was born in Mankato, Minn., and passed his boyhood days there. He entered the College of Physicians and surgeons at Chicago, and was graduated from that institution with honors. International prominence was given Dr. Edwards in 1910, when at the meeting of the American Medical Association he was chosen its president for the two-year term.

Dr. Edwards was a prominent Elk and Mason, and for many years served

BOND DEBT FIGURES GIVEN

St. Johns and Linton Add \$226,000 to General Fund Total.

Portland has a total general bonded indebtedness of \$17,084,390 and an improvement bond debt of \$13,808,466.85, according to a financial statement issued yesterday by City Auditor Barbour showing the status of the bond funds. These figures include the indebtedness of Linton and St. Johns, recently annexed to Portland.

In the general bond sinking fund there is a total of \$1,604,472.92, leaving a net total of general bonds outstanding of \$15,479,917.07. In the improvement bond sinking fund there is \$450,202.67, leaving a net outstanding indebtedness of \$13,352,162.18. The general bonds are a general obligation on the entire city. The improvement bonds are an obligation of property improvement by street grading, sidewalks, sewers and paving. The total bond figures include \$76,000 in general bonds and \$281,985.26 improvement bonds and \$150,000 in general mistake; he meant a hold-up."
