The Portland conference is regarded by the Administration as important, for its action will be laid before Congress, and if the conference is able to agree on a report, that report will outline the course that will be followed by Western men in Congress and seasion.

Ferris Bill to Neet Opposition.
As yet the Administration has not decided the form of water power bill or bills which it will commend to the new Congress, and no decision is likely to be reached until after the adjournto be reached until after the adjournment of the conference at Portland. It is possible that the Ferris bill may be indecreed in its original form, but the Administration has been advised against approving that bill, and the suggestion has been made that the hill be supported in the form in which it was reported to the Senate. The bill, even in that form, is not acceptable to Western Senators, and further amendments will be pushed next session, if the bill is reintroduced in the sion, if the bill is reintroduced in the shape in which it left the Senate com-
