SEATTLE, Wash., Sept. 5.—Seattle fans are now yelling for the Coast League, and they cannot be blamed. Without the knowledge or consent of President Robert L. Blewett, of the Northwestern Baseball League, or of President Dugdale, of Seattle, a job has been put through by Spokane, Tacoma and Vancouver which beats any other doubtful transaction ever before recorded in the annals of the Northwest old league.

Seattle Loses Chance.

This juggling of the schedule deprives Seattle of the chance of meeting Spokane tomorrow—games that the Beavers evidently desired to avoid—and places them on their home grounds at least 12 games.
