Plans and specifications were filed yesterday by City Commissioner Dieck for street and sewer proceedings as follows:

Sewer in East Seventy-eighth street from Salmon street to Taylor street, and in East Salmon street from East Seventy-eighth street to East Seventy-ninth street.

Sewer in East Eighty-third street from East Stark street to East Gilliam street, at an estimated cost of \$3300.

Grading and sidewalks in Macrum avenue from Edwards street to the city boundary beyond the recovery of St. Johns, at an estimated cost of \$1700.

Award of contract for the improvement of Columbia boulevard from Edwards street to the North Park railroad bridge is recommended to George Gundlach for \$274.

KELESO, Wash., Sept. 10.—(Special.)—Purchase by Charles Rudge of the townsite of Oak Point, together with about 130 acres of logged-off land and 1200 feet of Columbia waterfront, from the Henry A. Young estate has been completed.

Mr. Rudge plans to establish a cold-storage plant and creamery and operate a line of launches between Oak Point and Portland. A road will be opened to the new postoffice and public dock at Oak Point.
