OREGON CITY MAN WINS

Object Is to Establish Recognition of Sergeant Pearson Will Be Member of Team to Represent Oregon Guard at National Match. Governor's Trophy Up Today.

> The feature of the team matches in the state rifle shoot on the range at Ciackamas yesterday was the turning in of perfect scores in the 200-yard slow-fire match by Sergeant S. W. Miller, of Oregon City, and by Barney Miller, of Eugene, Eighth Company Coast

Sergeant Pearson, the winner of the Sergeant Pearson, the winner of the state individual match that was concluded yesterday morning, falled to repeat his performance of the day before, and returned a score of 19. The ranges of the state team match were the same as the individual matches—200 and 300 yards for rapid fire and 300, 600 and 1000 yards for slow fire.

The state individual matches were decided yesterday, when, in a sifff wind, the 1000-yard shoot was held, Fifteen shots for record were fired, and out of a possible score of 75 Sergeant. Fearson returned a score of 65.
This was considered remarkable, for the wind blew spasmodically and conditions for accurate shooting were bad.
