French ice cream—One pint cream one pint milk, eight egg yolks, one and one-half cups sugar, one table-spoon vanilla extract. Scald the milk and cream with the sugar, pour upon the well-beaten yolks and mix thoroughly. Cook very carefully over hot water until the mixture begins to coat the spoon. Strain, cool, add the flavoring and freeze like any ice cream.

Care is necessary to avoid curdling the eggs. If curdling begins, set the pan in cold water and beat the custard with a Dover beater. Sometimes a little brandy, sherry or Marschino is substituted for vanilla. A plainer ice cream can be made with six egg yolks as above. Very rich French cream may have as many as 12 egg yolks to the quart. More sugar is then needed.
