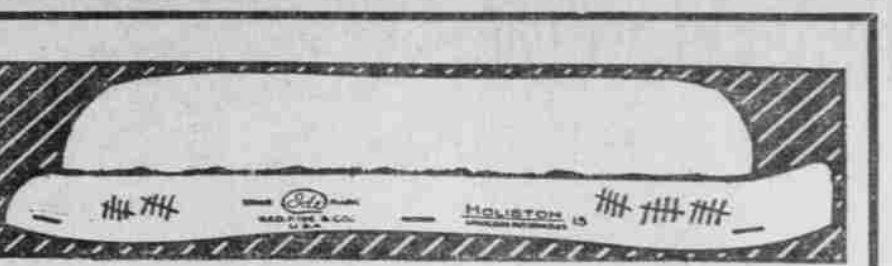
WALTER COCHATO WINS \$3000

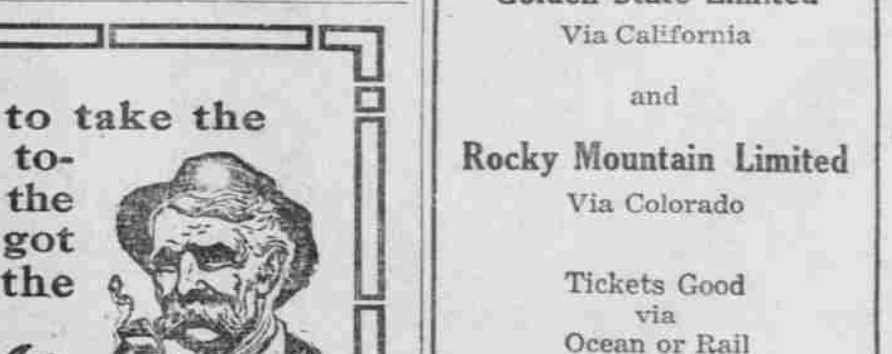
