NORTH PORTLAND TAXPAYERS MEET.—Taxpayers of North Portland held a meeting in the Couch School Thursday night in the interest of the proposed form of city government. S. H. Gruber presided. The principal speakers were W. T. Vaughan, Mark O'Neil, Olesky, Young, Mr. McLaughlin and T. Guinan. They were unanimous in their remarks that the present form of government is unsatisfactory and altogether too expensive. It was the opinion of all the speakers that it is time for the voters of the city to oust the commission form and place the city under a Council. There were other resolutions introduced and commented upon. The following committee was appointed to meet with committees from other parts of the city: T. Fisher, S. H. Harris, Joe Malley, E. Pinder, C. O. Siglin.

SENATOR TO RESERVE WOMEN.—Senator Chamberlain notified the Congressional Union for Woman Suffrage that he will "be glad" to receive a delegation of the members and friends of the union next Tuesday. The delegation will be a large and representative one. It is being expected that 200 women will take part. The leaders and speakers of the delegation will be announced later. This delegation is one of 95 which are calling upon every Senator in the United States before the convening of the 64th Congress. Like delegations also are waiting upon every United States Congressman, 435 in all, before the opening of Congress.

FAMOUS YACHTSMAN COMING.—Traveling in his private car, Philadelphia, Oliver Iselin, New York banker and famous yachtsman, will be in Portland for a quarter of an hour next Thursday morning. Mr. Iselin and members of his party will arrive at Southern Pacific train No. 15 from San Francisco at 7:30 A. M. and will depart at 7:35 o'clock for Portland. Iselin was the owner of the famous American's cup defenders Vigilant, Defender and Reliance. He is also managing owner of the yacht Columbia, which beat the Shamrock I.

OWNERS OF STOLEN JEWELRY SOUGHT.—Police detectives La Salle and Leonard are endeavoring to find the owners of several articles of jewelry recently recovered but of which no description has been turned in to the police headquarters as stolen. They have reason to believe the jewelry was taken in Portland. The articles are: An old-fashioned gold locket with faded prints of a man and woman with initials "E. A. W." on the outside; a gold thimble engraved with the name "Marguerite"; a ruby ring, surrounded by pearls; a large gold locket with "E. W." engraved on it, one pearl ring, a pearl brooch, a cameo stickpin, a man's gold watch chain and an English souvenir pin, commemorating the coronation of King George and Queen Mary.

MURDER AND SUICIDE REPORT FALSE.—Murder, suicide and sudden death reports at police headquarters yesterday morning exploded when the origin of the reports was discovered to be a fall down a flight of stairs at 385 Alder street, in which Mrs. C. Brown, 43 East Twenty-ninth street North, had her right wrist fractured. Reports that a murder had been committed, that a woman had committed suicide, and that a person had fallen from a third-story window brought a bevy of reporters and police to the scene of the accident.

VICTIMS ASKED TO BRING CHECKS.—G. D. Little, aged 23, was arrested by Detectives Swennes and Moloney yesterday morning charged with issuing numerous checks for small amounts, without money in the bank to redeem them. It is said to have told the detectives that he had no idea how many he had put out and a request has been made that all victims bring their checks to headquarters. H. C. MEXICAN SHOPLIFTERS SENTENCED.—Manuel Nichols and Manuel Mendez, two Mexicans who were arrested Thursday by Detectives Swennes and Moloney on suspicion and found to be shoplifters when clothing fell from beneath their coats as they were searched at detective headquarters, were sentenced to 90 days each in jail by Municipal Judge Stevenson yesterday.
