STREET IMPROVEMENTS UP.—City Engineer and Mr. Dieck Approve Contracts of \$40,000.

Street improvement contracts amounting to about \$40,000 will be up for final acceptance by the City Council next Wednesday, the work having been completed and accepted by City Engineer Oster and Commissioner Dieck. The improvements up for acceptance and the amounts of each are as follows: East Ankeny street from East Second street to East Third street, by Montague-O'Reilly Company, with concrete block pavement, amounting to \$234,906. East Seventy-first street and other streets with concrete, by Cochrane-Striding Company, amounting to \$12,907.78. Oregon street and East Twenty-third street with gravel bituminous pavement, by Gelbach & Joplin, amounting to \$13,148.50. Macadam street from Lowell avenue to the north line of section 15, with asphaltic concrete on crushed rock base, by O'Reilly Company, amounting to \$14,512.35.
