

PHILADELPHIA GETS READY FOR FANS

Thousands More Seats in Bleachers Completed for First Game Friday.

LONG LINE TO BE MISSING

Federal and Philadelphia Authorities Are Investigating Report of Pool by New York Concern, Which Will Be Broken Up.

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 4.—The Philadelphia Nationals began running today for the world's series with the Boston Americans, which opens here on Friday.

One familiar scene in connection with the big series will be lacking here this season. The Phillies' management has announced there will be no public sale of reserved seat tickets.

Despite this announcement the fans who neglected to make application by mail took a measure of encouragement from the fact that they will stand a chance of seeing the games from the bleachers. Some 5000 tickets for the bleachers will be disposed of at the park public sale on the day of each game.

More Seats Completed. The construction of the additional section of bleachers at the center field was completed just prior to the starting of the game with Brooklyn today.

Pool Scheme to Be Smashed. The Phillies management declined to clear the section and New York refused to play, forfeiting the game.

Federal and local authorities are investigating the reports that agents, said to represent a New York concern, are selling tickets for a big pool on the world's series and promising thousands of dollars to holders of winning coupons.

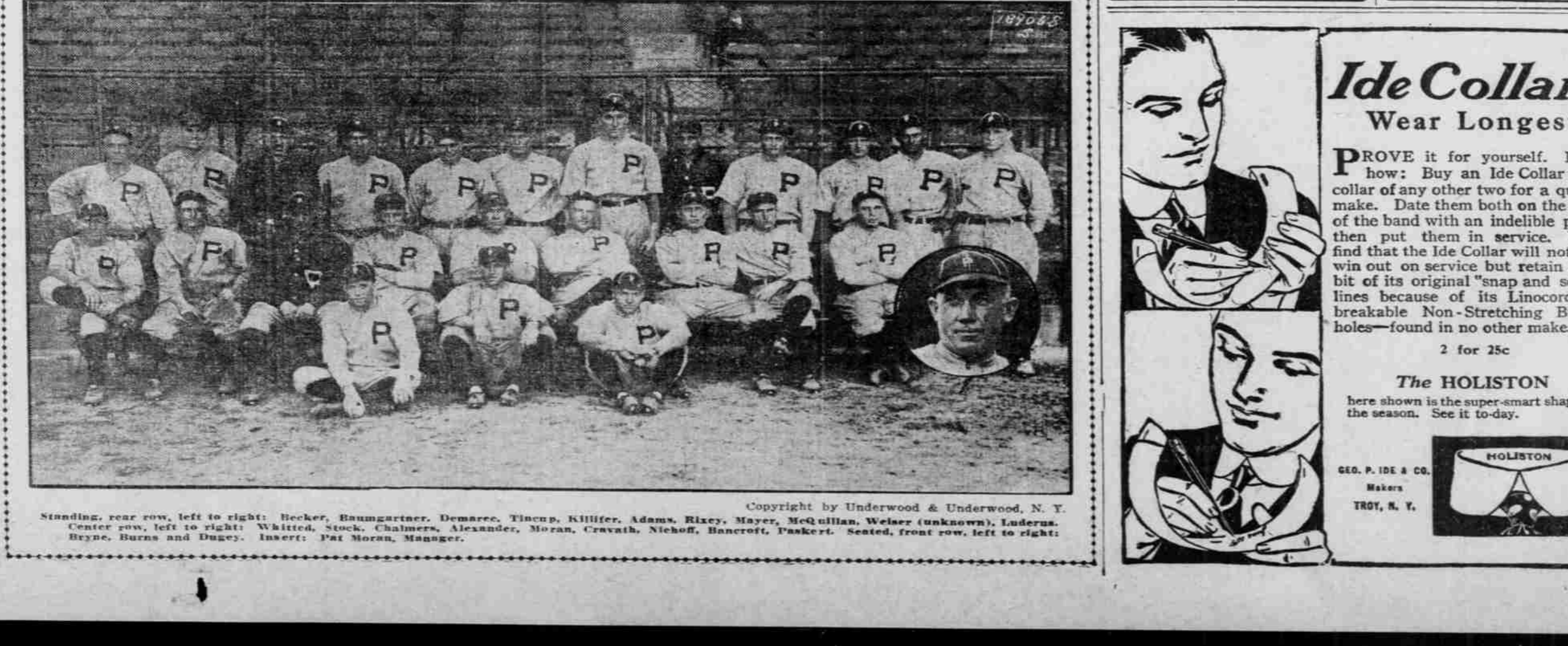
