

ANGLO-FRENCH LOAN OVER-SUBSCRIBED

America Takes \$50,000,000 More Than Half Billion Asked by Europe.

PROMINENT MEN INVEST

Bonds Likely to Be Issued and in Hands of Investors Within Week. Already Talk of Second Loan Is Heard.

NEW YORK, Oct. 4.—The Anglo-French \$500,000,000 bond issue has been over-subscribed. It is possible that when the underwriters' books are closed at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning it will be found that \$50,000,000 more than needed has been spoken for.

Notwithstanding many previous reports that the big issue had been over-subscribed, the total pledges up to Saturday night totaled less than \$500,000,000. Today's totals placed the sum subscribed in excess of the amount of the loan.

Both John D. Rockefeller and William Rockefeller have subscribed, the former, it is reported, for \$10,000,000, the latter for a sum believed to be less. Names to Be Kept Secret. Another subscriber of note, it was reported tonight, is Sir Ernest Cassel, former prime minister and financial adviser to the late King Edward VII of England. Sir Ernest takes \$5,000,000 worth of the bonds, paying therefor with money which he has already loaned and is now on deposit in this country.

Among the half dozen or more men who have subscribed for \$1,000,000 or more placed today the names of John Willys, automobile manufacturer; Harry Payne Whitney and William Boyce Thompson, of this city. There was no confirmation of this by J. P. Morgan & Co., who have announced that the names of individual subscribers will not be made public. Bonds to Be Issued at Once. It is possible that within a week the bonds will be in the hands of individual investors. The contract providing for the issue will be signed either tomorrow or Wednesday. In all probability the prospectus will be issued shortly and the issue offered to the public within a few days.

The closing of the underwriters' books tomorrow morning, announcement of which was made today, will end the opportunity of small investors to obtain their bonds at 96 1/2, the underwriters' terms. Hereafter the bonds will be offered at 97, New York City, New England and Pittsburgh have come up well to expectations—in the case of New England surpassing previous estimates—in the amount of subscriptions. It is estimated that they will take care of four-fifths of the issue.

ASYLUM RECALLS WOMAN

Efforts for Release of Mrs. Rose Byers Are Forestalled.

SALEM, Or., Oct. 4.—(Special.)—Mrs. Rose Byers, adjudged insane following the killing of her infant child in Portland, about a year ago, will be returned to the State Hospital here from Dr. Williamson's Sanitarium in Portland, where she has been on parole. The State Board of Control today authorized Superintendent Steiner to have the woman returned. Relatives, it was said, were making efforts to effect Mrs. Byers' release on the ground that she is sane. The hospital authorities hesitate to act, as she has not been under their charge of late, and it was decided that no action would be taken except under an order of the court directing her release.

MAN, 26, GIRL, 15, ELOPE

Father of Maid Enlists Sheriff and Starts on Chase.

CORVALLIS, Or., Oct. 4.—(Special.)—Edwin Johnson, aged 26, and Ruth Thompson, aged 15, eloped yesterday from Blissett, 15 miles west of here. That they came to Corvallis in an automobile yesterday afternoon and took a late train for Portland is the belief of friends at Blissett. Johnson and the young girl went to Sunday school together yesterday, and, before the close of the school, left the church, walked over the hill and have not been seen since. J. A. Thompson, father of the girl, boarded the excursion train from Newport and came to Corvallis, where he was met by Sheriff Gellatly and started search for the couple.

DALLAS PRISONERS ESCAPE

Two Men Slip Past Sheriff at Locking-Up Time.

DALLAS, Or., Oct. 4.—(Special.)—When the cells in the jail here were opened this morning it was discovered that two prisoners were missing. They are L. W. Carson and Lee McGinnis, both under indictment for larceny. Investigation disclosed that the pair escaped last night. They secreted themselves and slipped past Sheriff Orr while he was locking the prisoners in the cells. The crowded condition of the jail caused failure of the officer to note their absence. Several other prisoners made no attempt to escape.

FATHER SHOT BY HUNTER

Prominent Rancher May Undergo Operation at Roseburg.

ROSEBURG, Or., Oct. 4.—(Special.)—Charles Dyser, a prominent rancher living about 12 miles west of Roseburg, late today sustained a serious gunshot wound of the hand when he was shot by his son, who mistook him for a deer. At the time of the accident, Mr. Dyser and his son were hunting in the dense timbered district near Reston. Mr. Dyser's hand was badly torn and he was brought here tonight to hospital. He will probably undergo an operation tomorrow.

RELIGION, POLITICS FACTORS IN TRIAL

Catholics and Democrats Not Wanted on Jury, Charges Defendant's Counsel.

OBJECTION MADE TO COURT

Complaint Is Made in Behalf of Charles B. Munday, Alleged Bank Wrecker of Chicago—Prosecution Denies Charges.

MORRIS, Ill., Oct. 4.—(Special.)—Religion and politics were made prominent factors in the trial of Charles B. Munday, alleged Chicago bank wrecker, when John E. Hogan, the banker-promoter's chief counsel, protested to judge Stough that persons of Catholic faith and of the Democratic party, to which defendant belongs, were not being summoned as veniremen.

While the lawyers for the defense admitted they had no direct evidence against Hill, they declared they looked upon his failure to summon Catholics and Democrats as "something more than a mere inadvertency."

Catholics Are Discharged.

The charges were made in a "star chamber" session and out of hearing of the eight definitely picked jurors of the 12 to be selected.

Since the trial started, a week ago, the religious and political issues have been injected into the trial on several occasions by the defense. "I want to bring up the matter of the apparent elimination of Catholics from the venire," Attorney Hogan told the court at the conference. "Out of 55 veniremen drawn by Sheriff Hendrickson in the first two panels but eight or nine were Catholics."

Few Democrats Chosen.

"Out of the 25 veniremen summoned by Hill there has been only one or two Catholics. It also was observed there have been only three or four Democrats. It must have happened this way, but I did not like it."

State Hospital Expense Report In.

SALEM, Or., Oct. 4.—(Special.)—Patients of the Oregon State Hospital cost the state \$12,577 each for maintenance last month, according to the report of Dr. R. Lee Steiner, superintendent of the institution. There are now 115 patients at the hospital, an increase of 15 over a month ago. The report shows that it cost but 10.1 cents daily to feed the girls at the State Industrial School during September.

CHINA PLANS ELECTION

Rules for Voting on Proposed Monarchy Adopted. Primarys Will Be Completed November 5 and Final Vote Will Be Cast 10 Days Later.

PEKING, Oct. 4.—Regulations governing the election of members to a people's conference, which shall decide whether China shall adopt monarchical form of government, have been adopted by the state council, acting in the capacity of a legislature. The primarys will be completed on November 5 and the final vote cast in the provincial capitals 10 days later. If the vote favors a monarchy the restoration of that form of government will be promulgated. Today's dispatches indicate the giving of such authorization and show definite steps for the election of members of the body which will make the decision have been taken.
