SEPTEMBER GAIN BRINGS BILLION BUSHEL CROP

WASHINGTON, Out. 7.—A billion-bushed wheat crop, the greatest ever grown in any country, has been produced in the United States this year. The Government's pre-iminiary estimates of the great crop, made today, placed it at 1,002,029,009 bushels, or 111,000,000 bushels larger than the record crop of 1212.

The cern crop, new approaching maturity, is estimated at 3,026,159,000 bushels, or 85,000,000 bushels less than the record. The Bureau of Crop Estimates made the following comment on crop prospects;

"A slight improvement in corn prospects, but a material decline in prospects for petatest, are the prominent features of crop conditions in the United States on October 1.

"The corn forceast is 2,025,000,000 bushels, an increase over last month's forecast of 41,000,000 tushels. Last year's production was estimated at 2,673,900,000 bushels. The condition of the crop in lowa and the northern iler of states is conspicuously poor as compared with other portions of the country.
