

RUSSIANS BOMBARD PORT OF BULGARIA

Large Forces of Germans and Austrians Cross Serbian Frontier at Many Points.

GREAT OFFENSIVE BEGUN

Tentons Expect to Drive Way Into Serbia and Give Assistance to Turks—Mackensen Said to Be in Command.

AMSTERDAM, Oct. 7, via London, Oct. 8.—The Cologne Gazette reports two Russian cruisers actively bombarding the Bulgarian port of Varna.

LONDON, Oct. 7.—A dispatch from Berlin says that large German and Austrian forces have invaded Serbia. The Teutonic troops have crossed the Drina, Save and Danube rivers at many places.

It is said that the invading troops have established firm footholds on the other banks of the rivers.

Expected Campaign Begins

The invasion marks the beginning of the expected campaign against Serbia and may precipitate the crisis in the Balkans which has been looked for. Recent developments have shown that Bulgaria was likely to co-operate with Germany and Austria by attacking Serbia from the east. An army of French and British troops has been landed at Saloniki, Greece, and sent to Serbia to assist in meeting the new attack.

German and Austrian troops are said to have been despatched to the Serbian front from Russia, and it is reported that Field Marshal von Mackensen, the famous German commander, is in charge of these operations.

Plan Is to Aid Turks

The German plan of campaign is believed to be to force a way through Serbia, and if either the active assistance or the passive neutrality of Bulgaria is obtained, to reach the Sea of Marmora and give assistance to the Turkish army.

The announcement indicates that the invading movement is in progress along a large part of the boundary between Austria and Serbia. The Danube forms the border from the Hungarian frontier to Belgrade, the Save from Belgrade to the northwestern corner of the country, and the Drina runs along the western boundary to a point not far north of the Montenegrin line.

BULGARS CHARGED WITH SHAM

Agreement to Join Teutons Said to Date Back to May.

LONDON, Oct. 7.—A dispatch to the Morning Post from Budapest says: "Enthusiastic tributes are being paid by the newspapers to the work of Count Stephen Tizsa, the Hungarian Premier, and the Austro-German diplomats in bringing about an alliance with Bulgaria. The Pest Herald says: 'All former blunders and mistakes are forgotten, for the decision of Bulgaria is the greatest feat in the history of Austro-German diplomacy, and one can clearly discern the iron hands which direct it.'

The correspondent declares that the agreement with King Ferdinand, of Bulgaria, was reached in May, the condition being that Russia should be brought to such a state as not to be able to menace Bulgaria with the triple alliance, and the Premier Radoloff, the correspondent adds, were tied by this undertaking and they carried on only sham negotiations with the triple alliance to gain time, as well as for the effect on international political conditions.

GREEK PUBLIC APATHETIC

Impression of German Invincibility Gained by People.

LONDON, Oct. 8.—Discussing the attitude of the Greek people toward recent political developments, the Athens correspondent of the Daily Telegraph says:

"The public remains apathetic and no troubles are apprehended. The general feeling is that the people do not want to fight. At the same time this attitude is the conviction, instilled by an able German propaganda, of German military invincibility."

AGRIAN BULGARS ARRESTED

Government Takes Stern Measures to Insure National Unity.

LONDON, Oct. 7.—A dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company from Budapest says:

"The newspaper As Est says it learns from Sofia that wholesale arrests of the leaders of the Agrarian party are taking place and that the government is prepared to take stern measures to crush all domestic attempts to impair Bulgarian unity."

Roumania Near Mobilization

GENEVA, via Paris, Oct. 7.—Information reached Geneva by way of Munich today from a source which is regarded as reliable, that Roumania will issue a decree for general mobilization within the next 12 hours.

BORDER RAIDS MAY END

New Forces on Mexican Side Expected to Exterminate Bandits.

BROWNVILLE, Tex., Oct. 7.—Hope that the end of the Texas border bandit troubles is in sight was inspired today by reports from the Mexican side of the river, given unofficially by American Army officers, which said that bandits who have been using the Mexican side for a place of refuge were moving toward the interior, far back from the river.

An American from Reynosa, a Mexican river town in the district from which several raids have been launched into American territory, reported that since the arrival there early this week of Colonel Cantu and his command, soldiers of the new Matamoros commander, General Eugenio Lopez, there has been a notable change at Reynosa. Mexicans there seem to think the new regime will exterminate the outlaws.

\$10,000,000 for Railroad Favored

PASTOR WILL FIGHT

Dr. Hillis Summons ex-Business Manager Into Court.

LIVELY TILT IS PROMISED

Clergyman Says He Has Set Himself Task of Seeing That No One Suffers Loss Through Misplaced Confidence.

NEW YORK, Oct. 7.—Indication was given today that the financial affairs of Rev. Newell Dwight Hillis, pastor of Plymouth Church, Brooklyn, an edifice made famous by Henry Ward Beecher, will soon be aired in court. Attorneys acting for Dr. Hillis today obtained a summons requiring the appearance in the Supreme Court within 20 days of Frank L. Ferguson, ex-president of the board of trustees of Plymouth church and who for nearly five years managed the clergyman's business affairs.

It was a disagreement last March between Dr. Hillis and Mr. Ferguson that eventually led to a recent public acknowledgment by Dr. Hillis that he had been too keen to make money and that he had gone into speculation in order to make provision for his family and others dependent on him. He had learned, recently, the clergyman added, that property in which he and his friends had invested was of doubtful value, and he had set himself the task of seeing that no one suffered any financial loss through confidence they had in him or even through an introduction he had given.

The summons for Mr. Ferguson was obtained by counsel for Dr. Hillis, who it was said, is now prepared to go into court and ask for the examination of the minister's former business administrator.

Mr. Ferguson said today that he was glad the summons had been issued and that the matter was coming into court. "The public can look for some lively proceedings," he declared.

FIRE DESTROYS HOME

WINGFIELD FAMILY BARELY ESCAPES IN NIGHTCLOTHES.

Helpless Persons See House With Entire Contents Burn Down—Loss Partly Insured.

BAKER, Or., Oct. 7.—(Special.)—Escaping in their nightclothes, Mrs. August Rohrer, her daughter, Hildreth, aged 7, and her sister, Miss Alma Irvin, saved their lives at a fire that destroyed the Rohrer home, one mile north of Wingfield, last night. George Irvin tried to save them and was severely burned about the face and neck. Mrs. Rohrer was also badly burned about the neck.

The fire started just after Irvin had entered the house, and is believed to have been caused by a match dropped in the dining-room. As he opened the door to the stairway the air whipped the blaze and soon the room was in flames. The women were sleeping on the second floor and all dashed down the stairs and out of the front door.

Irvin tried to get water from the pump in the kitchen, but it would not work. Not knowing the women were safe, he then ran upstairs and was burned. The fire drove all away from the only pump, and they had to see the structure and all its contents burn to the ground. The occupants saved nothing but the nightclothing they wore.

Mr. Rohrer was sitting up with William Thompson, an ill neighbor. He saw the blaze, but could not reach home in time to assist. The loss is \$1500, with \$250 insurance.

COLEMAN PARDON TABLED

Defaulting Idaho Official Required to Report on Treasury Theft.

BOISE, Idaho, Oct. 7.—(Special.)—The Board of Pardon, in session here today, failed to consider the application of Fred M. Coleman, ex-Deputy State Treasurer, self-confessed embezzler of \$22,900 state funds. His case was continued. This action was taken because Coleman has not completed his work of establishing the total amount of money stolen from the treasury. He is assisting Expert Bogart. The board wants to know what he found.

Two complete pardons and one conditional pardon were granted; reduced sentences for 11 other applicants were recommended, and 27 applicants were denied. Charles Driskill, sentenced from Nez Perce County for a statutory offense, and Ed Mitchell, sentenced from Bonneville County for assault with a deadly weapon, were pardoned. J. M. Howey, sentenced from Ada County for issuing a worthless draft, received a conditional pardon, the condition being that he leave the state.

RAILROAD SAFE ATTACKED

One Arrested for Attempt to Rob Depot at Montesano.

ABERDEEN, Wash., Oct. 7.—(Special.)—One arrest today in Olympia followed an attempt made last night to rob the Montesano Northern Pacific depot safe by means of an acetylene torch. A hole was burned through the steel and iron front piece of the door but the work failed because of the exhaustion of the gas. Another arrest is expected to follow soon.

The men left the gas tank behind and this furnished clues which may lead to arrests. The Montesano Northern Pacific safe had been blown twice previously.

BAIL GRANTED TO LAWSON

Mine Leader Convicted of Murder May Go Free on \$35,000 Bond.

DENVER, Oct. 7.—The Colorado Supreme Court late today admitted John R. Lawson to bail in the sum of \$35,000. Lawson was convicted of first degree murder in connection with strike disorders.

Lawson was sentenced to life imprisonment on a charge of murdering John Nimmo, a deputy sheriff killed in the riot near Ludlow in October, 1913. The Supreme Court several weeks ago granted a supersedeas and writ of error. The question of admitting Lawson to bail was left undecided until today.

DANCE ON STREET TO MARK 'DRESS-UP'

Entertainment Features Are Arranged for Shoppers on Inspection Trip.

WOMEN TO BE JUDGES

Stores Are Making Strenuous Efforts to Capture Prize for Best Display of Goods in Windows—Parade Planned.

Dancing and merriment will be incorporated in Portland's Dress-Up week. Entertainment features will be added to what is proposed to be made an important trade event by the business community.

Public dancing will be enjoyed on Sixth street, between Morrison and Taylor streets, where the asphalt will be roped off and a band will be stationed in the Portland Hotel court to furnish music. Those who do not want to dance will be entertained with the music.

The dance in the street is programmed for next Monday night from 8:30 to 11 P. M. H. W. Pieroni, assisted by A. C. Holmes will be in charge of this feature of the entertainment. In case of rain the dance will be postponed one night.

Women to Judge Windows

The dance will be preceded by a parade through the downtown streets at 8 o'clock Monday night. Among other features of the week will be competitive window displays by the stores of the retail district, and it is predicted freely that the best showing of merchandise ever seen locally will be made.

Prices will be offered for the best window exhibits. Judges will be shoppers and many prominent women of the city will be asked to serve. There will be 15 sets of judges, one to judge each class of the displays having been divided into that number of classes.

Details were arranged at a dinner last night at the Chamber of Commerce, attended by display managers of the various stores, at which ideas were exchanged on classification and other features of the week. L. L. Baum, of the J. C. Clothing Company, general chairman of the Dress-Up week committee, and J. C. English, chairman of the retail merchants' bureau of the Chamber of Commerce, under whose auspices the meeting was held, presided.

Crowds of Shoppers Expected

It was arranged that display windows will be judged at 7 P. M. Monday night. Merchants may enter up to 6 P. M. tomorrow by making their application at the retail merchants' bureau, Chamber of Commerce. Each window entered in the contest must have an official Dress-Up week card displayed in it. These cards may be obtained at the Chamber of Commerce.

"Interest in the week is growing at a rapid rate," said chairman English last night. "It is bound to attract much attention throughout the city and the surrounding country and by adding entertainment features, there will be out-door attractions that will bring out the shoppers in large numbers."

The Commissioners have granted permission for roping off Sixth street and using it for dancing on the pavement and the affair will be policed so that the parade will be unobstructed. As Dress-Up week approaches, it is looming bigger all the time and it will be a really big event in Portland's merchandising history."

"We will have the greatest window displays ever seen in the history of the city," said Chairman Baum, of the general committee. "The merchants are going after these prizes and the display managers of the various stores are on their toes to make a creditable showing for their respective establishments. I expect the people will be surprised by the high quality and wide range of merchandise that will be displayed."

Classifications for the competitive window displays will be as follows: Grand prize, best individual window—Class A, men's clothing; class B, women's apparel; class C, boys' clothing; class D, children's clothing; class E, men's furnishings; class F, women's furnishings; class G, shoes; class H, millinery; class I, men's hats; class J, jewelry; class K, florists; class L, hardware; class M, furniture; class N, drugs and class O, stationery.

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
