

BIG LOSS ASSURED BY POLICY HOLDER

Woman Asks Order Restraining Mutual Life From Aiding Allies.

\$10,000,000 LOAN INVOLVED

Complaint Seeks Injunction Keeping Insurance Company From Using Its Money in Any Way for France or England.

CHICAGO, Oct. 11.—Alleging that the Mutual Life Insurance Company of New York contemplates investing \$10,000,000 of its trust funds in the Anglo-French loan of \$500,000,000, Mrs. S. Walsh, Chicago, today filed a \$2000 insurance policy in the Mutual suit for injunction in the Federal court here.

The insurance company, Charles A. Peabody, it was reported, directors, members of the Anglo-French credit loan commission, J. P. Morgan, individually, and J. P. Morgan & Company, are named as defendants. Frank S. Monnett, ex-Attorney-General of Ohio, who became nationally known through his prosecution of anti-trust suits in the state in the Standard Oil Company, acted as attorney for the plaintiff.

Difficulties Set Forth. The complaint to the court which was filed by Mrs. Walsh in person sets forth that among the thousands of policy-holders in the Mutual Life Insurance Company are many persons of various nationalities, and that the investment of the trust funds of these policy-holders in the Anglo-French loan would tend to produce antagonism among the policy-holders which might lead to disrupting the company and thereby depreciate the value of her interest in the company.

In the language of the bill, the court is informed that "the solvency of the company and the conservation of the reserve fund depends on the goodwill of the policy-holders and no part of the assets of the company should be loaned or invested in the securities of any of the warring nations or used for the purpose of aiding directly or indirectly investing its trust funds in the loan or from investing its trust funds or allowing any of its assets to be used for the purpose of aiding the manufacture of munitions of war, aeroplanes, submarines or any naval outfit or appliance to be used by the English or French nations for belligerent purposes."

Pioneer Passes Away at Gardiner. GARDINER, Or., Oct. 11.—(Special.)—Mrs. Charles York, widow of one of the earliest settlers in the Smith River Valley, died last week at her home on Smith River at the age of 83 years. Mrs. York is survived by two sons, William and Frank York, and two daughters, Minnie York and Mrs. C. C. Tucker, of Gardiner.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 11.—President Wilson today gave formal sanction to the plan of the Pan-American conference to extend recognition to the Carranza government in Mexico. Diplomatic representatives here of several South American governments received instructions to take the same action as the United States. Similar word is expected within a few days from the governments of all the other American republics. The time of recognition will be fixed then.

European governments, it is understood, will follow the lead of the United States and other American republics. Great Britain and France, it is known, have intimated that this would be their policy, and it is believed here Germany and Italy will do likewise, both having maintained an accredited agent to General Carranza for some time.

Correspondence that passed between Eliseo Arraondo, Carranza's representative here, and Secretary Lansing and members of the Pan-American conference, relative to the protection of foreigners, amnesty, treatment of the clergy and Carranza's pledge to restore constitutional government, became public today. It reveals that Secretary Lansing asked particularly of Mr. Arraondo concerning the attitude of the Carranza government toward the clergy. The Arraondo reply, dated October 8, follows:

"Complying with your excellency's request asking me what is the attitude of the constitutional government in regard to the Catholic Church in Mexico, I have the honor to say that, inasmuch as the re-establishment of peace, within order and law is the purpose of the government of Mr. Venustiano Carranza to the end that all the inhabitants of Mexico, without exception, whether nationals or foreigners, may equally enjoy the benefits of true justice and hence take interest in co-operating to the support of government, the laws of reform which guarantee individual freedom of worship should be strictly observed."
