

LAST TRIBUTE PAID TO MRS. DUNIWAY

Funeral of Distinguished Citizen Is Attended by Many Prominent Public Men.

DR. T. L. ELIOT OFFICIANT

Service Is Simple by Special Request and Eulogy Is on Life as Wife, Mother and Neighbor. Memorial Is Proposed.

It was a plain but impressive service—the funeral of the late Mrs. Abigail Scott Duniway—at the Unitarian Church yesterday.

Those hundreds of friends who attended were not there to pay the memory of the leader of the women's suffrage movement in Oregon. There was a deeper and more abiding sympathy.

They were there—as Dr. T. L. Eliot expressed it—to pay a last tribute of love and respect to one of the best, the noblest, the sweetest and strongest characters that ever has blessed our city and state.

It was Mrs. Duniway, the beloved neighbor, the true friend and the kind and loving mother who was remembered at the simple ceremonies in the little church at Yamhill street and Broadway. The crowd that gathered around her sorrowing relatives in the little church were among those with whom she had been most intimately associated in her private as well as in her public life. Included among them were many prominent public officials, who, through her long fight for the enfranchisement of her sex, had become personally acquainted with her. And having become acquainted they learned to respect her personality. One son, Willie Duniway, was unable to attend the funeral, being confined to his room by an attack of influenza.

Flowers Betoken Affection.

Many hundreds of floral offerings were distributed about the altar in the church wherein the plain gray casket stood. These came from her family and from some of her closest friends. Mrs. Duniway did not want an elaborate floral display.

The body was brought from her late residence to the church at 1 o'clock and was viewed there by scores of people. An hour afterward the simple church service began. Every seat was filled and many persons stood in the aisles.

Dr. Eliot, who had been a close friend of Mrs. Duniway and her family for many years, conducted the brief, simple service.

He opened the service with a Scriptural reading. A quartet of mixed voices sang "Nearer, My God, to Thee."

Dr. Eliot spoke only briefly, but effectively to console the members of her family and her numerous friends.

"This is no time for eulogy," said he, but referred to Mrs. Duniway's many admirable traits of character.

Neither, he continued, was it a time for great sorrow, for the soul of which departed once, he said, merely had solved the mystery of death into which all present soon will pass.

Faith in Future Urged.

He urged his hearers to have faith in the future and with this faith, he declared, death, when it comes, will be a pleasant and welcome experience.

He paid high tribute to "Mrs. Duniway's true friendship and called attention to the many faithful friends who mourn her departure as the best evidence of the esteem in which she was held by those who knew her."

In further testimony of her worth as a friend he read one of Cowper's poems on truth and valued friendship as befitting her eventful life.

His only reference to her work as a suffrage leader was when he declared that by her labors she had "glorified the state."

Dr. Eliot, who is pastor emeritus of the church, had charge of the service. Rev. W. G. Eliot, Jr., the present pastor, officiated with him. Following the brief sermon, the choir sang "Dry Those Tears" and Dr. Eliot offered a brief prayer.

The body then was conveyed to the Mount Scott cemetery, where private services were conducted for the family. The pallbearers, who were selected from among the nephews of Mrs. Duniway, were: Leslie M. Scott, Embrose B. Scott, John H. Scott, Paul R. Kelly, James B. McCord and Kenneth S. Latourrette.

Honorary Bearers Public Men.

The honorary pallbearers were Governor James Withycombe, H. L. Pitcock, Senator Chamberlain, Senator Lane, Judge M. C. George, Representative C. N. McArthur, George H. Himes, Ex-Governor Geer, Ex-Senator Fulton and Ex-Governor West.

It is probable that a public memorial service in honor of Mrs. Duniway will be held on the 31st anniversary of her birth on Friday, October 23. Many of her friends and the various suffrage organizations with which she was identified will participate in the event that such a ceremony is arranged.

The officers of the State Council of Women Voters met at the Portland Hotel yesterday and adopted the following resolution:

"Resolved, that in the passing away of Mrs. Abigail Scott Duniway the State Council of Women Voters deeply mourns the loss of its distinguished suffrage president and the leader of woman's suffrage in Oregon, and by this means begs to extend to her family the deep sympathy and regret that Oregon and the Pacific Northwest thus sustain in her loss."

Where the Vals cost from 75c to \$3.50 a yard, these B. B.'s cost from 10c to 50c. They have one piece there that has been washed a hundred times—that's how well it wears.

—The newest French magazines are showing charming dancing frocks made of lace and silver or gold satin or embroidered George. The lace is used as an under-skirt, with the panther-like drape made of the fancy material.
