# HOP TRADE IS LARGE

Three Thousand Bales Are Bought in Northwest.

## PRICES HAVE WIDE RANGE

Purchases Are for Account of October Shipment - No Export Buying Done Yet - Big Deal in California.

The largest amount of hop business done for this season was reported resterday, the sales in the Northwest aggregating about 3000 bales. The range of prices was wide, extending from 6 cents to a fraction better than 10 cents, according to the quality of the lots.

The rush of business was for account of October shipments and was not unexpected. The hops taken will probably all go to the stic trade. So far as could be learned, export business has been done recently. by T. A. Livestey & Co., who are credited

with purchasing nearly 2000 bales.
