There were no wheat sales on the loca board yesterday, and prices were not much changed from the day before, yet the market iad a very firm undertone.

A fair amount of activity was reported in the various country markets, where there was enough competition to keep prices strong. Not only were experiers buying in the country, but millers operated on a larger scale than for some time past. There was also inquiry for California account and reforts of some buying by Eastern houses.

It was the first full ses-sion in something like three weeks in which the output falled to attain soven figures, not to mention the many days in which dealings ranged from 1,200,000 to 1,700,000 shares.
