HENRY SUIT DISMISSED.—On motion of attorneys for Charles K. Henry, his suit against the Provident Trust Company, et al., was dismissed in the Federal Court yesterday on the ground that the issues involved are now before the State Supreme Court in a suit brought by James B. Bradshaw, one of the defendants in the suit. Most dismissed. Mr. Henry asserts that he traded real estate to the company for \$90,000 in its bonds on which it defaulted interest. He then turned back the bonds, according to his contention, for real estate on which there was a mortgage of \$40,000. Mr. Henry said he thought he was getting the real estate subject to the mortgage but that the Provident Trust Company inserted a covenant that Henry was to assume the mortgage. Now Bradshaw, in a suit to foreclose the mortgage, holds Mr. Henry liable in case the property did not satisfy the claim. The company contends that the clause in the deed was part of the agreement.

KREBS' CONTEMPT CASE DROPPED.—Supplementary proceedings to determine assets which Conrad Krebs may have to meet a judgment of \$2000 were held in Judge McGinn's court yesterday. Mr. Krebs testified that since 1911 he has conveyed a great deal of property to his wife, Mrs. Krebs, also testimony to show that he treats the debts and obligations of this property as his own. He testified that he sold one hop crop for \$125,000 and a farm for \$130,000, but had paid \$180,000 to the Ladd & Bush Bank, of Salem, "in liquidation." The contempt proceedings against Mr. Krebs, which arose from his failure to appear for supplementary examination on October 15, have been dropped in view of his present disposition to submit to examination.

POSTMASTER GETS 12 MONTHS.—L. E. Morrison, former postmaster at Zumbolt, Or., was sentenced yesterday to serve 12 months at the McNeil's Island Federal prison by United States Judge Head in a case involving a charge of embezzlement of \$1100 of the funds of the Postoffice. Judge Head sentenced Thom Thorsen, Robert Ridley, Earl From, Aaron Scherer, Archie Marten and James Graham to 60 days in the County Jail and to pay a fine of \$100 each for selling liquor to Indians. Arthur Walsh was sentenced to four months in jail and to pay a fine of \$100 for the same offense in more aggravated form.

EX-PATRIANAL FACES TRIAL.—R. T. Stewart, former police patron, was placed on trial in Judge Gantenbein's court yesterday on a charge of receiving stolen property. It is alleged that he purchased for a nominal sum from Charles Sundt a diamond-studded piece of jewelry worth \$125 or more. Charles Sundt had stolen from R. M. Rasmussen, a salesman for Rothchild Bros. Stewart denies that the locket was ever in his possession. The case probably will not be tried today. Stewart owes his discharge from the department the fact that he failed to give up the jewelry upon demand.

SALOONMEN AND STEPS.—The near approach of the dry wave in Oregon is indicated by a score or more suits which have been filed in Circuit Court by the North End Brewery Company, of Vancouver, Wash., to collect from Portland saloonmen on notes given in payment for beer. In almost every case the saloonmen have been given 30 days suits have been coming in at the rate of one and two, sometimes three, a day for the past two weeks. The amounts sued for vary from \$100 to \$1000. Defendants are mostly North End saloonmen.

ALLEGED ROBBER CAUGHT.—Luring Albert Campbell into a taxi cab, a saloon about 12:30 yesterday, Karl A. Olen and a companion took \$35 from him, according to the statement given to the police by Campbell. The two men then started to run and Campbell gave chase. Officers Wade and Mallon arrested him, but his companion escaped. Campbell is making good his escape. Campbell was held by the officers as a witness. The case will come up in the Municipal Court today.
