ASTORIA, Or., Oct. 27 .- (Special.)-With 11 feet of water in her hold and deck almost awash, the waterlogged four-masted Peruvian schooner ing by the tug Wallula after having escape from destruction last hight in the breakers just south of the south jetty. That the vessel was not lost is due to the assistance ren-dered by Captain Reed of the tug Wal-lula in tuning the

Harbor on October 16 for Callao, Peru, with a cargo of 616,514 feet of lumber, valued at \$6011. She carried a crew of 11 men, and the captain's wife was on board. Aimost immediately on leaving port she ran into heavy weather, and three days later as a result of the pounding and straining in the huge seas the vessel's seams opened and the water came in, but not at a rapid rate at first.

Shortly afterwards, however, the waves breaking over the craft put the gasoline engine out of commission by damaging the batteries, and the pumps could not be operated. Accordingly Captain Bardi decided to head for the coast and make some port for repairs.

Early yesterday morning he sighted Tillamook Rock and headed up the coast with all sails set. There was a Tillamook Rock and headed up the coast with all salls set. There was a thick haze at the time, and before Captain Bardi realized his position he was close in to the erd of the jetty. Signals of distress were run up, and the tug Wallula, which had the Bussian bark Fahrwohl in tow inside the harbor, dropped its tow and hastened out to give assistance. A hawser parted, and the Judith then drifted into the breakers and struck so hard aft that her stern opened until she was leaking at the rate of 17 inches an hour.

When the tug first took hold of the craft, Captain Bardi lowered some of the salls, and this prevented her from drifting so fast. All on board, however, thought the vessel was lost. Every preparation was made to lower the boats and attempt to reach the shore, and, as Captain Bardi remarked, "We didn't consider out lives worth a cross and this, with the ebb tide, gave the barkentine a slant off shore, and by skillful maneuvering she weatered the jetty, skirted along the outer edge of Peacock Spit, and headed north. In the meantime the Judith was leaking so badly that she was soon waterlogged.
