RUSSIA SEEKS CREDIT HERE Nine Per Cent Interest Is Reported Offer for \$60,000,000.

NEW YORK, Oct. 28 .- Agents of the

NEW YORK. Oct. 28.—Agents of the Russian government, it was reliably reported here today, are seeking to establish a credit loan in this country somewhat similar to the recent \$500.-000,000 Anglo-French credit loan—although no bond issue is contemplated—of from \$50,000,000 to \$100,000,000 and more, if it can be obtained.

Details of the proposed loan were lacking, but in one quarter it was reported that the Russian government was willing to pay as high as 9 per cent interest for a loan of this size. This report added that the loan probably would be for 18 months and would be in the neighborhood of \$50,000,000.
