

AMERICANS REPEL MEXICAN ASSAULT

Carranza's Soldiers Kill 15 Bandits in Battle Beyond Rio Grande.

BORDER WILL BE SWEEPED

First Chief Sends Reinforcements From Matamoros to Scene of Conflict—United States Troops Hold Their Trenches.

DOUGLAS, Ariz., Oct. 29.—The troops of General Francisco Villa were repulsed tonight to be finally in motion toward the international border for their impending attack upon Agua Prieta, Sonora, opposite here, where Carranza soldiers commanded by General P. Elias Calles are strongly entrenched.

BROWNSVILLE, Tex., Oct. 29.—A new attack by Mexican bandits on a patrol camp of United States soldiers and the reported killing of 15 bandits in a battle with Carranza soldiers acting under orders of First Chief Venustiano Carranza to clear the border of outlaws were developments today in the border situation.

Details of the reported fight on Mexican soil, which was said to have occurred 55 miles west of Matamoros, still were lacking tonight, but color was added to the story by the dispatch of 250 soldiers up the Rio Grande by General Eugenio Lopez, commander of the garrison at Matamoros. It was understood that they were to aid in prosecuting the search for outlaws who have been harrying the Texas border counties by incursions from their hiding places across the Rio Grande.

First reports of the fight between the bandits and the Mexican soldiers came from Reynosa, which repeatedly has been a source of reliable news concerning bandit activities. After seeing 15 of their number killed the outlaws were said to have fled, pursued by the government troops.

The Mexican bandits, who attacked a patrol of 20 United States Infantrymen at Capote ranch early today, charged the camp from three directions. The soldiers were in trenches and opened fire on the Mexicans at 50 yards. The firing continued for perhaps 10 minutes, when the Mexicans retreated.

It is unknown how many Mexicans were in the band, but it is said there were more than 15. Three of their horses were killed by the soldiers.

STREET LINE TO STAY

COURT ENJOINS INDEPENDENCE FROM CHANGE IN SURVEY.

Property Owners Sustained in Contention That Long Acceptance of Conditions Works as Bar.

DALLAS, Or., Oct. 29.—(Special.)—Circuit Judge J. H. Hart, today, in City of Independence from changing contested street lines in accordance with a survey made by County Surveyor Canfield, which would force adjoining property owners to move back several feet from the present lines. The court held that the city's long acceptance of the lines had enjoined it from making the change. The action was taken on a suit for injunction by J. Hart, of Independence, against the city.

The contested street was formerly a county road leading from the bridge at Independence, through North Independence and joining with the Salem road. The proposed change in the lines was bitterly threshed out in the Council before the case was taken to the courts.

Evidence was brought out at the trial that the street had been established for many years, that the city had accepted and that property owners had built fences and buildings on the basis of the present lines. The case lasted two days, and many witnesses were called. Judge Hart inspected the street before he decided the case.

Several Independence Councilmen have declared that the case will be taken on appeal to the Supreme Court.

standpoint and that the Sunday law should be enforced.

The question of the interpretation of the phrase in the law, "and all circumstances of necessity and mercy may be pleaded in defense before a jury," arose early. It was during the examination of T. J. Kaddery, the second man passed.

"If it were shown to me that it was necessary for the defendant to keep his place open on Sunday to make a living I surely would be for acquittal," he declared.

But, objected Mr. Mowry, "on that theory if we had a rich grocer on one side of the street and a poor grocer on the other, the wealthy man would be obliged to close while his competitor would not."

This precipitated a lively controversy on the definition of the word "necessity" as used in the statute. Mr. Mowry contending that it should be rigidly construed, while Mr. Hall insisted that it was up to each individual jurymen to decide in his own mind as a question of fact what constituted necessity.

Merchant Faces Difficulties.

Judge Dayton finally settled it by saying that in the absence of anything specific in the law he would have to hold that the word "necessity" referred not only to the necessity of the purchaser but of the seller as well. It was a question of fact for the jury, he declared.

Under this ruling each individual jurymen could have made his own definition. Attorney Hall proposed to show that Mr. Eastman, who runs the May grocery and bakery, a small place at East Sixth and Burnside, has been having a tough time to make ends meet.

"Sure, I'd let them stay open Christmas, Fourth of July, Sunday and every other day," declared Mr. Neppach. "I've a bunch of small business men as tenants, and you simply can't collect rents. They're all broke."

Mr. Neppach said, in a burst of antagonism, that he wouldn't believe under any circumstances a man who would do such work, referring to him as "the most contemptible thing alive." Later, he modified the statement to the extent of saying that, despite this feeling, he would not let the motives of Roberts and Akerheim sway him if actually satisfied that Eastman had actually broken the law.

However, prior to turning down his statement, Mr. Neppach did say that he wouldn't believe the statements of Roberts and Akerheim unless Mr. Eastman admitted their truth.

All Dislike Detectives.

The "stool pigeon" got it on every hand, not a single one of the jurors expressing anything but strong dislike for evidence of such a character.

At the conclusion of the jury drawing it was agreed between the attorneys and the judge that the jury might be taken to see the store of Mr. Eastman. But they reckoned without the jury. Up rose Mr. Neppach.

"Your honor," he said, "I think the jurors are unanimous in not wanting to take the time to see this place. If after the evidence is in we think we would like to see it, that will be time enough."

A poll of the jury brought out that the six men were unanimous in not wanting to waste the time for a visit having for its object first-hand information as to whether the store is properly classed as a bakery or a grocery.

"Can you bring the store to us?" Mr. Neppach asked the defendant.

"I guess I could in a fair-sized wheelbarrow," responded Mr. Eastman.

Buyers Back Complaint.

"The conditions of modern city life make Sunday sale of foodstuffs a necessity to the community is a sentence in Mr. Kellaher's complaint demanding an injunction in another place. It refers to it as 'now even a mercy in these hard times,' and again declares that Sunday closing would be 'detrimental to the peace, happiness, health, comfort and welfare' of city dwellers."

Appended to his petition was an affidavit signed by 14 apartment-house dwellers in the district surrounding his store, in which it was stated that none of those signed had ice boxes and that it was absolutely necessary that stores remain open so that they might obtain fresh meats, fruits, vegetables, milk and other articles of food on Sunday.

Robert G. Duncan, secretary of the Grocers' Association, expressed regret without any attempt at concealment in Judge Dayton's court when the fact of the injunction and its effect on further prosecutions developed.

"Cleanup" Plans Spoiled.

"We had a big cleanup all planned for next Sunday," was one of his statements.

Re G. L. Tuft, head of the agitation for a universal Sunday-closing law in the state, was a spectator again yesterday. He took a keen interest in the answer returned by the jurors and joined with Mr. Duncan in expressing regret because of the injunction.

Circuit Judge Gantenbein, before whom Kellaher's appeal will be heard, has already held the Sunday closing law unconstitutional. This was several years ago, when Tom Word, then Sheriff, arrested a poolroom proprietor for remaining open on Sunday.

How the recent Supreme Court decision will affect him in the present case remains to be seen. It is a fact, though, that the Supreme Court did not decide the constitutional questions, holding the law good under the police power of the state.

MAN RETAKES FIRST WIFE

Washingtonian, Twice Married, Again Weds Divorced Spouse.

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 24.—John Welch, 48 years old, a bookkeeper and accountant of Washington, D. C., procured a marriage license to wed his former wife, Alice J. Welch, aged 45, a clerk, also of Washington.

Welch has been married twice before, his first wife being the present intended bride. He was divorced from her June 22, 1900, by the Supreme Court of the District of Columbia, the ground for divorce being desertion.

ESKIMOS KILL 2 PRIESTS

TWO PROSPECTORS MURDERED ALSO, NORTH OF HUDSON BAY.

Tribe Believed Same Which Attacked Explorers—Guide Saves Life by Marrying Native Woman.

THE PAS, Manitoba, Oct. 23.—Two Catholic priests and two prospectors are reported to have been murdered by an inland tribe of Eskimos north of Chesterfield Inlet, Hudson Bay, according to Captain Lockhart, of the Royal Northwest Police boat Village Bell, which arrived here today from the North.

Captain Lockhart said he believed the four men had been murdered by the same tribe that attacked Radford and Street, the explorers.

A Topaluc guide, who was with Radford and Street, told Captain Lockhart that Street put up a hard struggle for his life and that with his body full of spears he lived from noon until sundown, when an Eskimo squaw cut his throat and pushed his body over a cliff.

The Topaluc saved his life by marrying one of the women of the tribe, and eventually made his escape to the bay coast. He positively refused to serve as guide for Inspector Bates, who wished to visit the scene.
