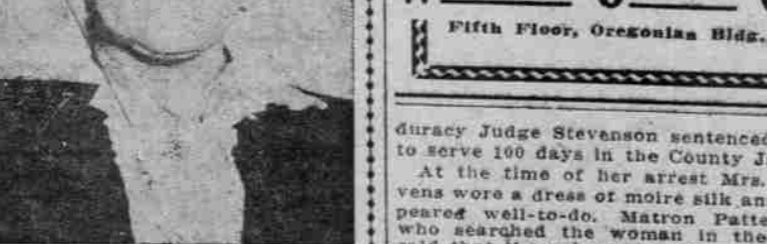
WOMAN SEALS LIPS. Silent Shoplifting Prisoner Is Sentenced to 100 Days.
