

VILLA GARRISON IN REVOLT IN SONORA

Rebel Leader Preparing to Take Defensive, Abandoning Other Plans.

AMERICANS BELIEVED SAFE

Men in Charge of Water and Lighting Plant Are Only Ones Compromised to Keep It Running; and Will Be Spared.

DOUGLAS, Ariz., Nov. 4.—The Villa garrison at Nogales, Sonora, including the forces left there by Jose Maytorena, are in revolt and on the verge of turning over to Carranza, according to official advices here tonight.

Preparations were made tonight to send at least one regiment of United States soldiers to reinforce the troops now on border duty at Nogales, the Villa garrison, with most of his artillery and cavalry, arrived today at Naco, Sonora, a border town a few miles west of Agua Prieta, whence he withdrew recently following a two days' battle with the Carranza forces under General P. Elias Calles.

Just what the intentions of Villa are is not generally known, but his retirement to Naco is taken in Mexican circles here to mean that Villa is preparing to take the defensive.

General Calles remains in Agua Prieta and with General Alvaro Obregon is preparing to carry out orders said to have been received for the extermination of Villa's army. Obregon's immediate plans have not been disclosed. Border folk, accustomed to Mexican war alarms, however, were settling down today in the absence of any prospect of a battle within possibly a month or six weeks.

Carranza Force at Hermosillo.

General Manuel Dieguez, the Carranza commander who for months has been reported proceeding slowly from the West coast, is at Hermosillo, according to information received by both Carranza and Villa agents. His presence at the capital of Sonora probably was the factor that determined Villa not to occupy the town of Hermosillo, but awaiting future battles there. Apparently he did not wish to be caught between Dieguez on the south and Obregon on the north.

Twenty-six Americans at Cananea were still safe today, despite the treatment accorded them by Villa and Miller and the two chauffeurs who thrice were threatened with death by Villa. Dr. Thigpen, however, was held at the request of General Obregon.

Americans Believed Safe.

The Americans at Cananea are in charge of the water and lighting plants of the Cananea Copper Company, and because there are no Mexicans there who are considered competent to keep the machinery running, little fear is felt for the safety of the Americans.

In addition there are in the Cananea district and the vicinity several other Americans who feel that they will be safe in any circumstances.

Major General Gustavus, commander of the Southern Department of the United States Army, who has decided to remain on the border for the present, today departed for Naco, Ariz., before his arrival at Naco General Villa made a trip to Cananea, a short distance from Naco, where Saturday a number of Turkish residents were reported arrested and held for ransom.

GRADE CONTRACT IS LET

JEFFERSON TO BUILD NEW ROUTE TO SUTTER LAKE PROJECT.

Protection to Be Afforded Motorists Along Dangerous Pass Toward Popular Summer Resorts.

CULVER, Or., Nov. 7.—(Special.)—At the November term of the County Court of Jefferson County, ending Saturday, a contract was awarded for the construction of a new grade a few miles west of Culver. The building of this grade will be of great importance to the construction of the Sutter Lake irrigation project involving the reclamation of 17,000 acres of land by bringing water from Blue and Sutter lakes. Several years ago while Jefferson County was yet a part of Crook County, about \$25,000 was expended for bridges across Crooked and Deschutes rivers and excellent grades were built in these canyons. However, the old grade east of Crooked River was not improved. Within a mile there is an ascent of 1000 feet, approaching a 25 per cent grade in places, and having a sheer drop of nearly 1000 feet from the edge of the road at the top with no protecting rails. As there will be between 500 and 1000 tons of material, machinery and supplies to be taken from the railroad to the project, the engineers of this grade will reduce the cost of construction of the project.

Notwithstanding the dangerous condition of the old grade, hundreds of automobiles traveled over it last Summer going to and coming from the Williams Valley via the Santiam and McKenzie routes. This new road will be the popular route between South Williams Valley points and Northeastern Oregon, as well as Washington and Idaho. This road also leads to the famous Metolius River country, where hundreds of people from Oregon and other states spend a few weeks in the Summer.

STURGEON DEALER FINED

Fred Christensen, Stunned and Captured, Pays \$20 for Fish.

Caught by Game Warden E. H. Clark in the act of selling a sturgeon only 20 inches long, Fred Christensen was fined \$20 in Justice Court yesterday, and being unable to pay was sent to jail.

Christensen was arrested Friday at the Stone Front saloon, on Fifth street, but not until he made an effort to escape and was tripped up by the officer and stunned by the fall.

The law provides that sturgeon under four feet cannot be sold.

Oil Trusts Increased.

CENTRALIA, Wash., Nov. 7.—(Special.)—The number of trustees of the Washington-Oregon Oil Company was increased from three to five at a meeting of the stockholders held in Tenino. The new directors are W. C. Haseltine and F. A. Bailey, both of Portland.

Drilling has been resumed at the company's well in Tenino, a depth of 525 feet having been reached.

PLEA IS STARTLING

Actress Exhibits "Votes for Women" on Her Back.

SANDWICH WOMEN BESTED

New York Ante-Election Crowds Made to Sit Up and Take Notice by Sensational Nature Poster Advocating Cause.

NEW YORK, Nov. 2.—No feature of the sensational campaign for woman suffrage that ended today was more startling than the act of a daring young woman of the stage, who exhibited at a "nature poster" her own comely back, on which was printed, in letters as large as space would permit, an appeal for the cause she advocated so ardently.

Even the band of "sandwich women" that invaded the subway bearing placards conveying arguments in favor of giving the ballot to women was outdone. All the other methods of the suffragists were outdone.

A beautiful and attractive young woman, Miss Dorothy Newell, who made all New York sit up with her appeal for "Votes for Women." It required considerable daring to promote the publicity Miss Newell had mapped out for the cause, but the fight for the extension of suffrage has been a daring one from the beginning. For several years she has been carrying on a campaign for woman suffrage, and there is no doubt about it, for one less ardent than she would have devised a different kind of campaign. She is a suffragist because she is a taxpayer herself, owning a little property in one of the suburbs of New York.

"I believe it unjust that I should pay taxes without representation," said she.

So in leading hotels and Broadway resorts, where the usual election eve crowds assemble, Miss Newell displayed her charming back with the alluring appeal "Votes for Women" painted in large black letter thereon.

City Makes Gifts to Emperor.

In observance of the coronation the City of Kio presented the Emperor with picture-books containing the works of 28 contemporary artists, a cushion designed by Sekka Kamisaka and a flower vase made at the Prefectural Ceramic Institute. The city also presented to the Emperor a solid lacquered box, two rolls of fine brocade with patterns of pine trees and a phoenix and five rolls of white silk damask with patterns of chrysanthemum flowers (the imperial crest) embroidered in deep blue.

On the day of the chief coronation ceremonial the City Assembly will call an extraordinary meeting and present an address to the Emperor, the writing of the address having been entrusted to Konan Naito, a noted scholar.

On November 18 the municipality will give a garden party at the Helan Shrine, inviting all guests from the Prince and Princesses of the blood downward, numbering 2500, who will participate in the coronation banquets.

Cherry Dance Is Planned.

The coronation celebration committee organized by prominent citizens of Kio has a plan to invite the participants in the coronation to the famous cherry dance, to a maple party on Mount Takao, and to present the guests with electric lamps. Nightly fireworks will be a feature of the coronation period.

To commemorate the coronation and the fact that official guests will stay in his house, which is known as the "Choraku Kan" or "Hall of Eternal Air," Kichibei Mura, a Kio millionaire banker, decided to make such alterations as would make it an accession or coronation memorial. He has planned a beautiful structure, half Japanese, half American.

CAROTHERS SURPRISED

AMERICAN DOUBTS HE IS OBJECTIVE TO OREGON.

Carranza Expected to Protest to Washington on Ground That Agent Is Partial to Villa.

DOUGLAS, Ariz., Nov. 7.—American officials here have taken up with Washington the protest of General C. Carothers, agent of the State Department, against the presence of General Obregon against the presence of General Carranza, on route from El Paso, is expected to return tomorrow, which event, it is understood, General Carranza himself will protest to Washington on the ground that Carothers is partial to Villa.

EL PASO, Tex., Nov. 7.—George C. Carothers, special agent of the State Department, who arrived here today at reports which yesterday said that General Obregon had protested to General Carranza against Carothers' appearance on the border near Agua Prieta because of Carothers' long association with the Villa government as representative of the State Department.

"I doubt that General Obregon had made any protest," he said. "I talked with General Carranza after his meeting with General Obregon and if Obregon had made any such statement I should have been informed. I also talked with the acting Consul, Douglas, and found him most cordial."

FOOD CHEAPER IN MEXICO

Transportation and Restored Money Values Help Capital.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7.—Discontinuance of many of the Government food stations in Mexico City was announced in dispatches received tonight by the Mexican confidential agency here.

Restoration of the transportation facilities and appreciation of the value of constitutional currency, the measure said, had reduced food prices to such an extent that it was considered necessary to maintain only a sufficient number of the Government stations to guard against manipulations by the merchants.

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ALBANY LID ON TIGHT

Even Drugstores Close, Despite Special Exemption.

FEW FEEL INCONVENIENCE

Occasional Citizen Who Forgot to

Lay in Stock of Cigars for Sunday Complaints, but General Tone One of Tolerance.

ALBANY, Or., Nov. 7.—(Special.)—

Albany was an absolutely closed town today. Cigar stores, confectioneries, groceries, floral shops—all had their doors closed. The only exception was the fact that they were obeying the law by drawing or hanging curtains over the doors.

Some of the drugstores, especially exempted from the provisions of the Sunday closing statute, were closed all day. A sign posted on the door of one, reading, "We can sell only medicines on Sunday," explained the reason.

Cigars Not Procurable.

It was the first time in Albany's history when everything was closed. You couldn't buy an ice cream cone or a cigar in Albany today. You couldn't even get a sack of popcorn or get your shoes shined, for the bootblack stands and the popcorn wagons on the street corners were closed, too. Newsboys sold papers on the streets as usual, but not even newspapers were sold in restaurants or other places allowed to remain open.

Local officers had announced during the week that the Sunday closing law would be enforced in Linn County hereafter and so far as known the law was obeyed strictly today. At least this was the case here in Albany and as Sheriff Bodine had instructed all of his deputies throughout the county to serve notice in all of the towns it is presumed that places of business affected were closed in all of the towns of Linn County.

Garages Stay Open.

The only places open which are not especially exempted by the law were garages. Local peace and police officers decided that inasmuch as it seemed to be the intent of the law that they not be closed, they would make no effort to close them until the courts construed this particular phase of the act. The statute exempts livery stables and the officers decided that if livery stables were to be exempted from the law was passed in 1864, it was the intent that garages, which have succeeded livery stables in a large measure, could remain open.

The only places of amusement or recreation open here today were motion picture theaters. Theaters are espe-

cially exempted from the necessity of closing.

Streets Unusually Quiet.

Local police officers say there were fewer people on the streets of Albany today than on any Sunday in years. The enforcement of the Sunday closing law was probably the chief reason, though the fact that it was a stormy day may have been a contributing cause.

The closing of the stores and shops appeared to be taken in good humor. People generally seemed to regard the situation in a humorous spirit, and jokes about the condition were heard. Once in awhile some man who hadn't run across a newsboy and wanted to get in a drugstore or cigar store to get a newspaper was a little "peevish," and occasionally some man who had inadvertently forgotten to lay in a supply of cigars discouraged with anger on "frank laws," but generally speaking, a spirit of levity seemed to pervade those who beheld

locked doors which heretofore have remained not only open but hospitably inviting on Sunday.

FIRE CASUALTIES ARE 12

Eight Women, Four Men, Victims of Candy Factory Blaze.

NEW YORK, Nov. 7.—Twelve bodies, those of eight women and four men and the list of missing narrowed down to one man summed up today the casualties as the result of the fire in the Diamond Candy Factory building in Brooklyn yesterday.

Reports from the hospitals, where 41 injured were taken after the fire, showed that fewer than 30 were detained for further treatment, others having been sent to their homes.

Fire Commissioner Adamson tonight issued a statement in which he declared the loss of life among the

workers on the fourth and fifth floors of the building was due to the fact that one of the two stairways to the lower floors was blocked by a locked door on the third floor. Escape by the other stairway was cut off by the flames.

Northwest Postoffices Moved.

OREGONIAN NEWS BUREAU, Washington, Nov. 7.—The Postoffice at Myrtle Point, Or., will move into new quarters on the west side of Fifth street, between Maple and Spruce, on December 1. The Postoffice at Pullman, Wash., will be moved to new quarters on the north side of Paradise street, between Alder and High, November 15.

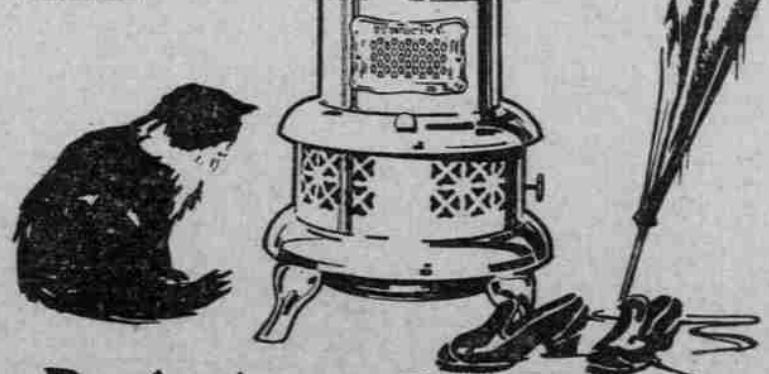
