Joseph Supple Will Build Speedy Craft, 150 Feet Long, for Passenger Service on Puget Sound.

Joseph Supple was awarded the contract yesterday by the Kitsap Trans-portation Company, of Scattle, Wash, for the construction of a steamer making 22 miles an hour, to be ready for delivery May 1, at a cost of \$80,000. The vessel will be of the propeller type and built along the lines of the Kitsap, Hyak and Reliance, all of which Mr. Supple turned out at his Belmont-street yard for the same corporation. The length is to be 150 feet, with a beam of 25 feet, and she will develop 2200 horsepower with a Scaburg en-sine.


